



The University is situated near Jaranwala Road not very far from the historical Clock Tower. The Board considers and reports to the authorities on the research degrees in the University.

Rules E Regulations

1. Eligibility:

Females having domicile of Punjab and having at least 45% marks (50% for Computer Science/Information Technology) marks in intermediate (excluding 20 marks of Hifz-e-Quran) eligible for admission.

2. Domicile:

The candidate with domicile other than the Punjab province has to produce a nomination letter from her respective provincial government against reserved seats if any. Foreign students and overseas Pakistani students can also apply through the relevant Federal Ministry/Embassy.

3. Age Limit:

The maximum age limit for eligibility is 22 years on the closing date of the application. However, the age may be relaxed up to four years by the Competent Authority.

4. Time of Admission:

Admissions shall be conducted in the Fall semester and only once in a calendar year. If a candidate fails to complete enrollment, her admission shall be cancelled. In special situation the Vice Chancellor may allow admission to any program in spring semester.

5. Admission Procedure:

The merit will be calculated considering aggregate 30% weightage marks obtained in matric and 70% weightage marks in FA/F.Sc./I.Com/ICS or equivalent examinations (30:70 for Matriculation: Intermediate) (Equivalence will be calculated by the Equivalence Committee).

6. Authority of Admission:

The admission to Bachelor degree programs shall be made by Director Academics.

- a) Applications will be submitted to the office of the Directorate Academics and the said office will calculate the merit of eligible candidates.
- b) Lists of selected candidates shall be displayed by the office of the Director Academics (DA) and if needed subsequent lists shall be displayed till the last seat is filled up.

(Explanation: The last list would be displayed keeping in view that 75 percent attendance in lectures would not suffer).

- c) The Competent Authority may refuse admission to a candidate without assigning any reason.
- 7. Admission will be granted strictly on merit i.e. 30% weightage marks obtained in matric and 70% weightage marks in FA/F.Sc./I.Com/ICS or equivalent examinations (30:70 for Matriculation: Intermediate) in 2021 and 2022 for morning programs only. However, candidates of the earlier sessions will be considered by deducing 10 marks for each year for evening programs only.
- **8.** Addmission will be granted provisionally subject to verification of the certificates of the candidates from the relevant Secondary Board. Equivalence certificate is required from IBCC Islamabad/Lahore (where applicable).
- 9. For all the programs 20 marks for Hafiz e Quran will be granted to those candidates who will be declared successful after evaluation by the Admission Committee constituted.

- 10. Students who want to change the subjects will be allowed if one falls under merit of that program with the permission of Competent Authority.
- 11. If a student gets admission by mistake (human error/computer etc.) and does not full fill the criteria of admission mentioned in the prospectus, her admission shall stand cancel automatically and there will be no liability on the part of the institution.
- 12. Each student will submit a "Declaration" on a judicial paper of Rs:-50/- at the time of enrolment in the office of Director Academics (specimen is annexed).
- 13. Besides the open merit, the candidates may apply against the reserved seats for different programmes as explained under:

A. For Morning Programmes:

Besides the open merit the candidates may apply against the reserved seats i.e. 2% seats for sports, 3% seats for disables, 2% seats for children of University employees (1% for teaching and 1% for non-teaching), 4% seats for FATA, 2% for FANA (Gilgit Baltistan), 1% for Balochistan, 1% for Kashmir, 1% for Gawadar, 2% seats for co-curricular activities, 5% seats for overseas Pakistanis and 2% Minorities. However, there will be no sports and co-curricular quota for BS (Public Administration), BBA and BS (Commerce).

Note: There will be no reserved seats in Balochistan, FATA, FANA (Gilgit Baltistan), Kashmir, and Gawadar quota where entry test in mandatory to qualify for seeking admission.

B. For Evening Programmes:

Besides the open merit, the candidates may apply against the reserved seats i.e 2% seats for Children of university employees (1% for teaching and 1% for non-teaching).

Note:

- a. Only such candidates will be admitted on sports quota who has qualified the test/ interview.
- b. Admission on the reserved/quota seats will be completed by the admission committee (s) in accordance with the admission rules for reserved seats.

14. Change of Department:

14.1 Form Transfer: After display of the merit lists subject to the availability of seats, the transfer of forms from one department to another department in the morning program may be allowed through admission committee subject to deposit of amount as per processing fees/Prospectus fee decided, in University account as transfer fee if all eligible applicants are exhausted and the seats are vacant in the desired department.

14.2 Subject Change: If a student even after submission of the fees in a respective department wishes to change the subject, she can apply to the Director Academics on the prescribed Subject Change Performa after depositing the amount as per processing fees/prospectus fees decided, in the university account if the seats in the desired department are vacant.

Furthermore, if there is a difference in fees of the two subjects, the students have to pay additional fee of the changed subject if any. However, if the fee of the changed subject is less than she has already paid then there will be no refund of the fee difference.

- 15. Admission to BS Fine Arts, VCD, Fashion Designing program will be granted on the basis of Aptitude Test (50% qualifying marks) conducted under the Directorate of Academics.

Admission Policy/Criteria MS/MPhil Programs

1. Eligibility:

Females all over the Pakistan are eligible for admission.

- 2. The candidates must have passed MA/M.Sc (minimum 70 credit hours) or BS 4-years (minimum 130 credit hours) or equivalent degree in the relevant field from HEC recognized institution with at least 50% marks (Under Annual System) or 2.50 CGPA (Under Semester System) for admission to MS/M.Phil Programs. However, student obtaining 50% marks in M.A under annual system are eligible to get admission in M.Phil English Linguistics.
- 3. Minimum Academics Requirement: A candidate seeking admission to the degree must have sixteen years of education or 4 years education after F.A./F.Sc./A-Level or equivalent (at least 130 credit hours) with at least second division/CGPA 2.50 in the degree on the basis of which admission is requested and qualified (50% marks) a GRE/HAT General/Equivalent as adopted by the Directorate of Academics of GCWUF.

11.1 The seats will be linked with the strength of the requisite faculty concerned. However on the recommendations of the admission committee the Competent Authority will decide to enhance the seats where necessary.

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1. Eligibility:

- 1.1 Females all over the Pakistan are eligible for admission.
- 1.2 The candidates must have passed MS/M.Phil with minimum CGPA 3.00 out of 4.00 (Under Semester System) or 1st Division 60% (Under Annual System) in M.S/ M.Phil or equivalent degree from HEC recognized institution.
- 1.3 If the CGPA/Percentage is not mentioned on the transcript, the candidate must produce equivalent weightage from the parent university.
- 1.4 The students having strong demonstrated interest in obtaining PhD degree, but their CGPA is below 3.00 (out of 4.0 in the semester system) or 60% marks (in the annual system) in the most recent degree obtained, may be admitted to a PhD program after fulfilling the following requirements:
- 1.4.1 Shall study additional courses of 9-12 CH of level 7 taking a zero semester at admission awarding university/HEI/DAI and score minimum 3.00 out of 4.00 GPA, and
- 1.4.2 The admission committee is satisfied that the applicant's knowledge of primary area (level 7) has sufficiently prepared him or her to undertake the course of studies of the doctoral program.

3. Domicile:

The candidate should submit the domicile certificate. Any Foreign students can also apply through the relevant Federal Ministry and their relevant department(s).

4. Age Limit:

No age limit for the admission in Ph.D. programs shall be observed as long as there is no mental handicap.

5. No Objection Certificate (NOC):

The applicant working in government/semi government institutions seeking admission in PhD have to take NOC from their parent department within 1 Month from the date of admission otherwise their admission will stand canceled and there will be no liability on the part of the institution. Any concealment of the facts if found at any stage of the study will be liable to cancelation of their admission.

6. ADMISSION CRITERIA

Minimum Academics Requirement: A candidate seeking admission to the degree must have M.Phil./MS/ six years education after F.A./F.Sc./A-Level/ any other equivalent Educational Certification for the degree on the basis of which admission is requested, in at least first division/CGPA 3.00) and qualify (60%) subject GRE/HAT General test conducted by the Directorate of Academics of GC Women University Faisalabad.

6.2 Statement of Purpose

As part of the application for admission to PhD programs, applicants shall be required to submit a statement of purpose, which shall form an integral part of the application.

The admissions committee shall use the information provided to ascertain the preparedness and interest of the candidate in pursuing doctoral studies, and whether the department has the requisite resources to train and supervise the doctoral candidate in the subspeciality in which the applicant is interested.

A statement of purpose shall, at least, include the following:

- 6.2.1 Title of the potential research proposal
- 6.2.2 Clear articulation of the current understanding of the intended field and ideas for potential research
- 6.2.3 Explanation of the intended impact of the proposed research

The prospective candidates shall demonstrate passion and enthusiasm for the area of research.

7. Intra-disciplinary Qualifications

Intra-disciplinary5 Qualifications

Consistent with best practices internationally (including leading global universities), intradisciplinary admissions may only be allowed, if:

- i. The university/HEI policy allows, and
- ii. The applicant has a strong interest in pursuing a PhD in a different discipline.
- iii. The applicant has passed GRE-Subject/Equivalent Test with minimum 50% marks in the discipline of admission and has taken 6-9 CH of deficiency courses of level 7.

The admission committee is satisfied that the applicant's knowledge of the primary area (level 7) has sufficiently prepared her to undertake the course of study of the doctoral program (or, in the opinion of the admissions committee, the preparation can be deemed satisfactory by taking a few additional courses after starting the program).

8. TIME OF ADMISSION:

Admission may be conducted twice a year i.e. in the fall semester and spring semester. If a candidate fails to complete enrollment, her admission shall stand cancelled. However, nominees of HEC, GCWUF, foreign countries and other government organizations, may be admitted up to the end of each semester with the condition that they will have to cover up the courses by taking seminars, special problem and research project.

9. AUTHORITY OF ADMISSION

- a) The admission to a degree program shall be made by the Board of Advanced Studies and Research (BASR) on the basis of merit list prepared and checked by the Directorate of Academics.
- b) Lists of selected candidates would be displayed by the Director Academics and if needed subsequent lists would be displayed till the last seat is filled up.
- c) (Explanation: The last list would be displayed keeping in view that 75% attendance in lectures would not suffer).
- d) The Board of Advanced Studies and Research (BASR) may refuse admission to a candidate on disciplinary or moral grounds or on the violation of university rules.
- 10. The Candidate must have passed with 70% score of subject GRE. For this purpose the following committee has been constituted:

- e) Admission to the Ph.D programs will be made through Directorate of Academics as under:
- a. Applications will be submitted to the Director of Academics, the office of DA will calculate the merit of eligible candidates.
- b. The merit lists will be displayed by Directorate of Academics.
- c. Admission will be granted strictly on merit basis and in accordance with the guidelines provided by HEC.
- f) The candidate must have secured minimum 60% in subject GRE conducted by DA.
- g) Candidates working in Government/Semi Government or private institutions shall have to submit "No Objection Certificate" from the concerned organization.

- 11. Each student has to submit a "Declaration" on judicial paper of Rs:-50/- at the time of enrolment in (Specimen is annexed).

After completion of the admission, the course registration form UG-1/GS-10 of all the admitted candidates will be sent to the office of the Controller of Examinations within 30 days from the date of commencement of classes. All the Deans and Directorate of Academics will also reconcile the fee data with University Treasurer within 30 days.

Parallel admission in any program shall not be allowed. University reserves the right to change any clause of admission policy or refuse admission to any applicant on disciplinary grounds.

Furthermore, the Vice Chancellor has been authorized to amend any clause of schedule according to the requirement.

University may refuse admission to any applicant on disciplinary grounds.

The admission on reserved seats will be made through a committee constituted by the Competent Authority.

1. MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION:

The medium of instruction and examination shall be English (except faculty of Islamic and Oriental Learning, which will be Urdu or their relevant subject languages).

2. DURATION OF THE COURSE:

The duration for the BS(H)/BBA shall not be less than eight and more than 12 semesters.

3. **DURATION OF THE SEMESTER:**

There shall be 2 semesters (Fall and Spring) of 18 weeks each in an Academics year. The commencement of semesters shall be regulated by the Academics Council.(Explanation: Out of 18 weeks, 16 weeks shall be actual teaching time; the rest may be utilized for enrollment, conduct of examinations and declaration of results, etc.).

4. SCHEMES OF STUDIES:

The schemes of study for the various degree programs are given in the Prospectus which may be amended from time to time.

5. CREDIT HOURS REQUIREMENT FOR VARIOUS DEGREES:

The minimum credit hour requirement for various degree programs shall be as following:

BS (4 years): 130 credit hours

6. ROUTING OF Academics MATTERS:

All the Academics matters shall be routed through proper channel i.e. through the Chairperson /Incharge of the Department/Director/Principal/Dean/Coordinator of the faculty concerned..

7. ENROLLMENT REQUIREMENT:

A candidate admitted to the course shall enroll for each semester, as long as she has not completed all the requirements for the degree, subject to the maximum admissible limit of semesters.

8. ENROLLMENT:

- 8.1 An application for enrollment on the prescribed Course Registration Form (UG-1) accompanied by proof of fee paid (bank receipt) shall be presented to the office of the Directorate of Academics on the day(s) notified for enrollment.
- 8.2 The office of the Dean/Coordinator under special circumstances and on payment of late fee of Rs. 200/- may permit a student to submit Course Registration Form within 5 working days after the commencement of the classes.
- **8.3** The Vice Chancellor may allow a student to submit Course Registration Form till the last day of the 4th week after the commencement of classes, with fee of Rs. 500/-
- **8.4** Enrollment in absentia is not allowed. Student is required to be present in person with a proof of identification (University Identity Card or Computerized National Identity Card etc.) for enrollment.
- **8.5** Enrollment will only be considered complete when Course Registration Form (UG-1) is submitted to the office of the Director Advanced Studies and it is mandatory for the completion of the enrollment process.

- **8.6** A candidate admitted to a degree program shall, for so long as the student has not submitted thesis / Research report / Research paper/Internship report (whichever is applicable), have to enroll for each semester.
- **8.7** The maximum duration for completion of degree shall be as under:

The students who will enroll in the first additional semester beyond the normal tenure of the program will have to pay an additional tuition fee of 50% and for rest of the additional semesters will have to pay 100%, additional tuition fee over and above the regular fee

9. DISCONTINUATION/FREEZING OF STUDY/SEMESTER:

- 9.1 A student may discontinue enrolled semester before appearing in the final examination with the permission of the Vice Chancellor obtained through the Registrar on the recommendations of the Dean/Coordinator of respective faculty and Director/Principal/ Chairperson /incharge, on account of sickness duly certified by the MS of DHQ hospital or due to circumstances beyond her control subject to fulfillment of condition that the student has passed the final examination of previous semester with minimum prescribed GPA/CGPA.
- 9.2 The facility of discontinuation can be availed only once during whole degree program for only one Academics year (two semesters).
- 9.3 A student so permitted to discontinue is required to resume her studies after two semesters (one freeze and one gap with zero credit) in the same semester which she has freezed i.e if a student freezes her 4th semester, 5th will be her gap semester and she will resume her studies after one year (two semester) in her 4th semester with the next session on the recommendation of Chairperson/Incharge/ Director/Principal/Dean/Coordinator concerned and notified by the Registrar. She will pay full semester fee after defreezing/rejoining the studies.

 Note: However the student will follow the scheme of studied s of her own session.
- 9.4 During the semester freeze, bonafide status of the student shall remain suspended. The student will not be entitled to avail any privilege as that of a regular student. Student has to submit the complete fee/dues for the freezed semester and Rs: 5000/- for the gap semester also along with Under Graduate Course Registration (UG-1) form to maintain her studentship.
- 9.5 A candidate shall not ordinarily be allowed to discontinue her studies during 1st semester.

10. RE-ADMISSION:

- **10.1** If a student fails to enroll in any semester(s) without permission of the Competent Authority, the student shall cease to be on the rolls of the University and in case the student desires re-admission, the student shall have to apply for the same in the next coming admissions.
- 10.2 The office of the Director Academics on the recommendation of Dean/Coordinator and by the permission of the Competent Authority may re-admit such a candidate subject to the payment of Rs.5000/- as re-admission fee in addition to the regular semester fee.

Re-admission will be allowed only if a student can maintain 75% attendance in the admitted semester

10.3 The Dean/Coordinator may refuse the re-admission if the reasons presented are not convincing.

Note: The period of gap semester will not be counted towards residential requirements.

11. REVISION OF COURSE REGISTRATION FORM:

- 11.1 A student may be permitted to revise her Course Registration Form (UG-1) within 20 days from the commencement of classes. After this period the student may be allowed to revise UG-1 Form up to the 4th week from the commencement of classes on payment of Rs. 500/- as late Course Registration fee.
- 11.2 The student of first semester may be allowed to revise her Course Registration Form within first four weeks of the last date of enrollment without any late fee.

12. COURSE OF STUDY:

All graduate courses will be allocated appropriate course code numbers and will be preceded by the suitable alphabets indicating the name of the respective department.

- 12.2 Teachers/instructors will be required to hand over detailed course outline to the students within 7 days of the beginning of semester and will send a copy of course outline and work plan to the chairperson of the concerned department
- 12.3 A full time student can enroll up to 24 credit hours in a regular semester including regular plus repeat courses. However, the Vice Chancellor may relax enrollment rules up to 1extra Course for the last year (either odd or even semester) in special cases.
- 12.4 A course can be repeated two times (maximum three times enrollment) at the most. The

Controller of Examinations office will mention corresponding repetitions in the result notification and the student shall mention repetition status in the Course Registrations Form (UG-1) at the time of enrollment.

- 12.5 The Dean/Coordinator may consider credits earned by a student at another recognized
- Institution, subject to a maximum of 50 percent of the minimum credits requirements for the degree, on the recommendations of Equivalence Committee provided that: The contents of the course(s) for which credit is claimed, are identical or similar to the course included in her planned course work and the courses for which credit is claimed have not been used for another degree.
- 12.6 A course studied to qualify a degree will not be taken/ considered for any other and higher degree program.
- 12.7 Credit earned for a course shall lapse on the expiry of five years for regular student and seven years for part time student from the end of the semester in which the course was qualified. The Vice Chancellor may revalidate the lapsed courses for special reasons to be recorded.
- 12.8 No course shall carry more than 4 credits.

13. EXAMINATIONS:

- 13.1 Examination Fee: University examination fee shall be charged at the time of enrollment of each semester.
- **13.2** Tests and Examinations:
- a) There shall be two examinations 'mid and final' in each semester. In addition to these examinations the teacher shall give home assignments and quizzes etc. to the students. The mode of these examinations will be left to the teacher, who will be solely responsible for the conduct of examination as well as evaluation in her course. The grade awarded in the course by the teacher shall be final.
- **b)** Only those students, who have at least 75% attendance in theory and practical classes (where applicable) separately in each course, shall be eligible to appear in the final examination.

- c) A teacher shall report to the Dean/Coordinator/Director/Principal concerned through the Chairperson of the respective Department the names of students who are absent from the lectures/ practical's (where applicable) continuously for seven days to enable the office of the Dean/Coordinator to strike off names of such students. The student may be readmitted under the university rules or may be refused admission if the reasons provided for readmission are not convincing.
- 13.3 Final examination: The final examination for a semester shall be held on a schedule notified by the teacher in advance.
- 13.4 The answer scripts of each examination shall be discussed with the students.
- a) The mid-semester examination shall be held during 9th week of the semester which shall carry 30 percent of the total allocated marks for the course. This examination shall be conducted by the teacher concerned who shall proceed according to the University rules.
- b) For the purpose of evaluation, one credit will carry 20 marks e.g. a four credits course will carry 80 marks. These marks will be divided in accordance with the credits assigned to theory and practical (where applicable) for each course.
- c) The following weightage shall be given to the examinations, home assignments, etc
- d) Student have to appear separately in Mid-term, Final Term and Practical Examination in each course. If a student fails to appear in anyone of the above mentioned examinations, then she will be considered fail in that course

(Fraction in total marks of a course will be rounded to the nearest to one decimal point)

- 13.5 To qualify a course, it is essential to pass separately in the theory and practical (where applicable) examinations with aggregation to be at least 40 percent.
- 13.6 The teacher shall send the final award list along with answer scripts of mid, final and practical (where applicable) of the course to the office of the Controller of Examinations within 10 days after the end of a semester. The Dean/Coordinator may condone the delay in result submission. A soft copy of the award list should also be sent to the office of the Director/Principal/ Chairperson and the Dean/Coordinator concerned.
- 13.7 On receipt of the award lists, the Controller of Examinations shall notify the results and send copies to the office of the Dean/Coordinator, Director/Principal and the Chairperson/ Incharge of the concerned Department.

14. GRADE POINT AVERAGE:

14.1 Grade point and equivalence between letter grading and numerical grading shall be as follows:

- **14.2** If a student fails to obtain CGPA of 1.75 at the end of each Academics year (after three consecutive Fall, Spring and Summer Semesters) her admission shall stand cancelled. However the student may seek fresh admission.
- 14.3 Student is allowed to improve her D grades in any course of previous semesters during her course of study but only once.

A student, who obtains CGPA of 1.75 or more but less than 2.50 upon the completion of entire approved course work may be allowed to repeat once the courses of the previous semesters in which the students had obtained the lowest grades in order to improve the CGPA so as to obtain the minimum of 2.50, failing which the students shall cease to be on the rolls. A student is allowed to improve only those number of D grades required to get 2.50 CGPA for obtaining her degree, failing which the students shall cease to be on the rolls provided that she has availed the maximum permissible repetitions.

CGPA of 2.5 out of 4.0 is required to qualify for the award of degree.

15. THESIS / RESEARCH PROJECT/ INTERNSHIP:

- 15.1. A student can opt for thesis/research project /internship (6 credit hours) in lieu of two optional courses of 3 credit hours each or whatever decided by Board of Studies of respective department.
- 15.2. The Minimum Criteria for a BS student to opt for a research and thesis should be CGPA not less than 3.80 after 6th Semester.
- 15.3. A student shall be required to submit a thesis/project research report and present it in a seminar /viva for evaluation conducted by an external examiner or committee of department examiners. The student has to clear all the courses before appearing in the final seminar/viva of research project/thesis.
- 15.4. There shall be 120 marks corresponding to 6 credit hours (equivalent to 2 optional courses, equivalent to minimum 6 credit hours).
- 15.5. The supervisor through the respective Chairperson shall send the award list of thesis/paper/internship report in sealed envelope to the office of the Controller of Examinations. The Controller of Examinations shall notify the final result of the student.
- 15.6. Original plagiarism report along with the Certificate from Supervisor and Declaration by the student must be submitted while submitting the thesis to the Director of Academics. The Director of Academics shall notify the dates for the semifinal and Final phases of thesis submission.
- 15.7. The thesis evaluation should be completed within one month from the date of submission of thesis to the Controller of Examinations. The Controller of the Examinations shall get the approval of two external examiners (one an alternative in case of regret of the examiner) from the Vice Chancellor and the thesis shall be dispatched to that examiner.
- 15.8. Supervisor, after consultation with the external examiner shall write to the Controller Examination notifying the date, time and venue of thesis evaluation.
- 15.9. The colour of hard bound cover of BS Program should be black with title superimposed in golden

16. SUPERVISORY COMMITTEE:

- **16.1 a)** The Supervisory Committee of a student shall be proposed by the respective Board of Studies of Department/Institute during the 5th semester for the thesis and for research paper only one supervisor will be appointed by chairperson.
- b) Supervisory Committee shall consist of at least 03 teachers of department. However, if any outstanding specialist in a major/ elective field of study is available outside the University, she may be taken as a member of Supervisory Committee in place of a teacher or as an additional member.
- c) Supervisor of the student will act as Chairperson of Supervisory Committee.
- d) Supervisory Committee proposed by the respective Board of Studies and recommended by the Chairperson/ Director of Institute/Principal, shall be approved by the Competent Authority.
- 16.2 In case, a student duly recommended by the Chairperson / Director/ Principal concerned to conduct her complete/part of thesis research in other institution/laboratory, is allowed by the office of the Dean/Director; the helping scientist may be taken as co-supervisor/special member on the supervisory committee of the student. However, the university will not bear any financial liability in this context.
- 16.3 Foreign Faculty members, HEC National Professors/HEC Eminent Scientists may act as supervisor/member of the supervisory committee provided that they are appointed for three years.
- 16.4 Adhoc/contract teachers may act as supervisor / member of the Supervisory Committee only where there is shortage of regular faculty members. Faculty on Tenure Track System (TTS) / Interim Placement of Fresh PhD program (IPFP) will be considered as regular faculty for the subject purpose

17. General:

- 17.1 The student who will enroll beyond her minimum limit of the semesters will be have to pay an additional tuition fee of 50% and for rest of the additional semesters will have to pay 100%, additional tuition fee over and above the regular fee.
- 17.2 After submission of the thesis, the students will not be allowed to reside in the University hostels.
- 17.3 Office of the Dean/Coordinator will maintain student record for 3 years after the declaration of final result. After that period, the record may be disposed off with the permission of the Vice Chancellor.
- 17.4 Office of the Controller of Examinations shall keep scripts of student's examinations for whole session (4 years).
- 17.5 The minimum number of students to start a class is 15.

However, the Competent Authority may grant approval to start a class which is not fulfilling the above-mentioned number in special cases during regular and summer semesters. The policy is not applicable for the fail/re-sit students improving the lower grades.

1. MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION:

The medium of instructions and examinations shall be English (Except Faculty of Islamic and Oriental learning, which shall be in Urdu or their subject language).

2. DURATION OF THE COURSE:

The duration for the B.Ed (1.5 year) shall not be less than three and more than 05 semesters.

3. DURATION OF THE SEMESTER:

There shall be 2 semesters (fall and spring) of 18 weeks in each academic year. The commencement of semesters shall be regulated by the Academic Council. (Explanation: Out of 18 weeks, 16 weeks shall be actual teaching time; the rest can be utilized for enrollment, conduct of examinations and declaration of results, etc.)

4. SCHEME OF STUDY:

The subjects of study for the degree program are given in Schedule- I which may be amended from time to time. B.Ed. (1.5) Students have to take two Teaching Practices during their degree (each practice for one month) after 2nd and 3rd semester.

5. MINIMUM REQUIREMENT FOR THE VARIOUS DEGREE PROGRAMMES:

A student admitted to the degree program shall be required to take minimum 54 credits.

6. ROUTING OF ACADEMICS MATTERS:

All the Academics matters shall be routed through proper channel i.e. through the Chairperson /Incharge of the Department/Director and Principal/Dean/Coordinator of the college/faculty concerned.

7. UNIVERSITY EMPLOYEE:

Since B.Ed (1.5 years) has fixed scheme of studies, University employees cannot avail the facility to enroll B.Ed (1.5 years) like BS.

8. ENROLLMENT:

- 8.1 An application for enrollment on the prescribed form; Course Registration Form (UG-1) accompanied by proof of fee paid (bank receipt) shall be presented to the office of the Director Advanced Studies on the day(s) notified for the enrollment.
- 8.2 The Director Academics under special circumstances and on payment of late fee of Rs.500 /- may permit a student to submit her Course Registration Form within ten days after the commencement of the classes.
- 8.3 The Vice Chancellor may allow a student to submit her Course Registration Form till the last day of the 4th week after the commencement of classes, with double late fee i.e., Rs.1000.
- 8.4 Enrollment in absentia is not allowed. Student is required to be present in person with a proof of identification (University Identity Card or Computerized National Identity Card etc.) for enrollment.
- 8.5 Enrollment will only be considered complete when Course Registration Form (UG-1) is submitted to the office of the Director Advanced Studies. Only depositing of fee will not serve the purpose.

9. DISCONTINUATION/FREEZE OF STUDY/SEMESTER:

- 9.1 A student may discontinue enrolled semester before appearing in the final examination with the permission of the Vice Chancellor obtained through the Registrar on the recommendations of the Chairperson/Incharge/Director/Principal and Dean/Coordinator, on account of sickness duly certified by the MS of DHQ Hospitalor due to circumstances beyond her control subject to fulfillment of condition that the student has passed the final examination of previous semester with minimum prescribed GPA/CGPA required for the said degree program.
- 9.2 The facility of discontinuation can be availed only once during the whole degree program and that too for one academic year (two semesters only).
- 9.3 A candidate shall not ordinarily be allowed to discontinue studies during the 1st semester.
- 9.4 A student so permitted to discontinue is required to resume her studies after two semesters (one freeze and one gap with zero credit) in the same semester which she has freezed i.e if a student freezes her 2nd semester, 3rd will be her gap semester and she will resume her studies after one year (two semester) in her 2nd semester with the next session on the recommendation of Chairperson/Incharge/ Director/Principal/Dean/Coordinator concerned and notified by the Registrar.
- 9.5 During the semester freeze, bonafide status of the student shall remain suspended. She will not be entitled to avail any privilege of a regular student
- 9.6 An HEC fellowship awardee will be allowed to join a training program with the condition that her training would not disturb her enrollment in the University and will remain in contact with the concerned department. On her return and rejoining the University, she would have to meet the enrollment formalities (Ex-post-facto) of this period (the whole period of HEC scholarship) and it would also be included in the period of residential requirements of the scholar.

10. RE-ADMISSION

- 10.1 If a student fails to enroll in any semester(s) without permission of the Competent Authority, she shall cease to be on the rolls of the University and in case she desires re-admission, she shall have to apply for the same.
- 10.2 The office of the Director Academics on the recommendation of Dean/Coordinator and by the permission of the Competent Authority may re-admit such a candidate subject to the payment of Rs.5000/- as re-admission fee in addition to the regular semester fees. Re-admission will be allowed only if a student can maintain 75% attendance in the admitted semester.
- 10.3 The Dean /Coordinator may refuse the re-admission, if the reasons presented are not convincing. Note: The period of gap semester will be counted towards residential requirements.

13. Examinations:

- 13.1 Examination Fee: University examination fee shall be charged at the time of enrollment of each semester.
- 13.2 Tests and Examinations: a) There shall be two examinations 'Mid and Final' in each semester. In addition to these examinations the teacher shall give home assignments and quizzes etc. to the students. The form of these examinations will be left to the teacher who will be solely responsible for the conduct of examination as well as evaluation in her course. The grade given in the course by the teacher shall be final but.
- b) Only those students, who have at least 75% attendance in theory and practical separately in each course, shall be eligible to appear in the final examination.
- c) A teacher shall report to the Dean/Coordinator/Director/Principal concerned through the Chairperson/Incharge of the concerned Department the names of students who are absent from the lectures/practicals continuously for seven days to enable Director Academics to struck off names from the university of such students. She may be re-admitted under the university rules or may be refused admission if the reasons presented for re-admission are not convincing.
- 13.3 The final examination for a semester shall be held on a date and time and place to be notified by the teacher in advance.
- 13.4 To pass a deficiency course a student is required to obtain at least "D" grade.
- 13.5 The scripts of each examination shall be discussed with the students.
- 13.6 The mid-semester examination shall be held during 9th week of the semester which shall carry 30 percent of the total allocated marks for the course. This examination shall be held by the teacher concerned who shall determine the form of the examination.
- 13.7 For the purpose of evaluation, one credit will carry 20 marks e.g. a four credits course will carry 80 marks. These marks will be divided in accordance with the credits assigned to theory and practical for each course.
- 13.8 The following weightage shall be given to the examinations, home assignments;
- (a) Mid-semester examination 30%
- (b) Home assignments quizzes, presentations 20%
- (c) Final examination 50% Total: 100% (Fraction in total marks of a course will be rounded to the nearest to one decimal point)
- 13.9 The duration of examination shall be as under;

Mid-Semester Examination One hour

Final Examination Two to three hours

13.10 Final examination covering the full syllabus with at least 25% of the course of midterm as well, shall be held at the end of each semester.

13.11 Question paper for the mid and final term examination shall be set by the respective teacher. However, Chairperson/ Principal/ Director/ Departmental Incharge shall ensure the quality and standard of the question paper set by the teacher.

To qualify a course, it is essential to pass separately in the theory and practical examinations.

- 13.13 The teacher shall send the final award list along with answer scripts of mid, final and practical for the course to the office of the Controller of Examinations within 10 days after the end of a semester. The Vice Chancellor may condone the delay in result submission. A soft copy of the award list should also be sent to the office of the Chairperson /Director/Principal of the College and Director Academics.
- 13.14 On receipt of the award lists, the Controller of Examinations shall notify the results and send copies to the Director Academics, Dean/ Coordinator/Director/Principal and the Chairperson/Incharge of the Departments concerned.

14 Grade Point Average:

14.1 Grade point and Equivalence between letter grading and numerical grading shall be as follows:

- 14.2 If a student fails to obtain CGPA of 2 at the end of each academic year (after three consecutive Fall, Spring and Summer Semesters) her admission shall stand cancelled. However the student may seek fresh admission.
- 14.3 Student is allowed to improve her D grades in any course of previous semesters during her course of study but only once. A student, who obtains CGPA of 2.00 or more but less than 2.50 upon the completion of entire approved course work, may be allowed to repeat once the course(s) of the previous semesters in which she obtained the lowest grades in order to improve the CGPA so as to obtain the minimum of 2.50 failing which she shall cease to be on the rolls. A student is allowed to improve only those number of D grades required to get 2.50 CGPA for obtaining her degree, failing which the students shall cease to be on the rolls provided that she has availed the maximum permissible repetitions. CGPA of 2.5 out of 4.0 is required to qualify for the award of degree.

1. MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION:

The medium of instruction and examination shall be English (except faculty of Islamic and Oriental Learning, which will be Urdu or their relevant subject languages).

2. DURATION OF THE COURSE:

The duration for the Associate Degree Program shall not be less than four (04) and more than six (06) semesters.

3. DURATION OF THE SEMESTER:

There shall be 2 semesters (Fall and Spring) of 18 weeks each in an Academics year. The commencement of semesters shall be regulated by the Academics Council. (Explanation: Out of 18 weeks, 16 weeks shall be actual teaching time; the rest may be utilized for enrollment, conduct of examinations and declaration of results, etc.).

4. SCHEMES OF STUDIES:

The schemes of study for the various degree programs are given in the Prospectus which may be amended from time to time.

5. CREDIT HOURS REQUIREMENT FOR VARIOUS DEGREES:

The minimum credit hour requirement for various degree programs shall be as following:

ADP (2 years): 71 credit hours

6. ROUTING OF ACADEMICS MATTERS:

All the Academics matters shall be routed through proper channel i.e. through the Chairperson /Incharge of the Department/Director/Principal/Dean/Coordinator of the faculty concerned.

7. ENROLLMENT REQUIREMENT:

A candidate admitted to the course shall enroll for each semester, as long as she has not completed all the requirements for the degree, subject to the maximum admissible limit of semesters.

8. ENROLLMENT:

- 8.1 An application for enrollment on the prescribed Course Registration Form (UG-1) accompanied by proof of fee paid (bank receipt) shall be presented to the office of the Directorate of Academics on the day(s) notified for enrollment.
- The office of the Dean/Coordinator under special circumstances and on payment of late fee of Rs. 200/- may permit a student to submit Course

 Registration Form within 5 working days after the commencement of the classes.
- 8.3 The Vice Chancellor may allow a student to submit Course Registration Form till the last day of the 4th week after the commencement of classes, with fee of Rs. 500/-
- 8.4 Enrollment in absentia is not allowed. Student is required to be present in person with a proof of identification (University Identity Card or Computerized National Identity Card etc.) for enrollment.
- 8.5 Enrollment will only be considered complete when Course Registration Form (UG-1) is submitted to the office of the Director Academics and it is mandatory for the completion of the enrollment process.
- 8.6 The maximum duration for completion of degree shall be as under

Minimum Maximum

4 Semesters (2- Years) 6 Semesters (3- Years)

The students who will enroll in the first additional semester beyond the normal tenure of the program will have to pay an additional tuition fee of 50% and for rest of the additional semesters will have to pay 100%, additional tuition fee over and above the regular fee.

9. DISCONTINUATION/FREEZING OF STUDY/SEMESTER:

- 9.1 A student may discontinue enrolled semester before appearing in the final examination with the permission of the Vice Chancellor obtained through the Registrar on the recommendations of the Dean/Coordinator of respective faculty and Director/Principal/ Chairperson /incharge, on account of sickness duly certified by the MS of DHQ hospital or due to circumstances beyond her control subject to fulfillment of condition that the student has passed the final examination of previous semester with minimum prescribed GPA/CGPA.
- 9.2 The facility of discontinuation can be availed only once during whole degree program for only one Academics year (two semesters).
- 9.3 A student so permitted to discontinue is required to resume her studies after two semesters (one freeze and one gap with zero credit) in the same semester which she has freezed i.e if a student freezes her 4th semester, 5th will be her gap semester and she will resume her studies after one year (two semester) in her 4th semester with the next session on the recommendation of Chairperson/Incharge/ Director/Principal/Dean/Coordinator concerned and notified by the Registrar. She will pay full semester fee after defreezing/rejoining the studies.

Note: However the student will follow the scheme of studied s of her own session.

- 9.4 During the semester freeze, bonafide status of the student shall remain suspended. The student will not be entitled to avail any privilege as that of a regular student. Student has to submit the complete fee/dues for the freezed semester and Rs: 5000/- for the gap semester also along with Under Graduate Course Registration (UG-1) form to maintain her studentship.
- 9.5 A candidate shall not ordinarily be allowed to discontinue her studies during 1st semester.
- 10. RE-ADMISSION:
- 10.1 If a student fails to enroll in any semester(s) without permission of the Competent Authority, the student shall cease to be on the rolls of the University and in case the student desires re-admission, the student shall have to apply for the same in the next coming admissions.
- 10.2 The office of the Director Academics on the recommendation of Dean/Coordinator and by the permission of the Competent Authority may re-admit such a candidate subject to the payment of Rs.5000/- as re-admission fee in addition to the regular semester fee. Re-admission will be allowed only if a student can maintain 75% attendance in the admitted semester.
- 10.3 The Dean/Coordinator may refuse the re-admission if the reasons presented are not convincing. **Note:** The period of gap semester will not be counted towards residential requirements.

11. REVISION OF COURSE REGISTRATION FORM:

- 11.1 A student may be permitted to revise her Course Registration Form (UG-1) within 20 days from the commencement of classes. After this period the student may be allowed to revise UG-1 Form up to the 4th week from the commencement of classes on payment of Rs. 500/- as late Course Registration fee.
- 11.2 The student of first semester may be allowed to revise her Course Registration Form within first four weeks of the last date of enrollment without any late fee.

12. COURSE OF STUDY:

- All graduate courses will be allocated appropriate course code numbers and will be preceded by the suitable alphabets indicating the name of the respective department.
- Teachers/instructors will be required to hand over detailed course outline to the students within 7 days of the beginning of semester and will send a copy of course outline and work plan to the chairperson of the concerned department
- 12.3 A full time student can enroll up to 24 credit hours in a regular semester including regular plus repeat courses. However, the Vice Chancellor may relax enrollment rules up to 1extra Course for the last year (either odd or even semester) in special cases.
- 12.4 A course can be repeated two times (maximum three times enrollment) at the most. The Controller of Examinations office will mention corresponding repetitions in the result notification and the student shall mention repetition status in the Course Registrations Form (UG-1) at the time of enrollment.
- 12.5 The Dean/Coordinator may consider credits earned by a student at another recognized Institution, subject to a maximum of 50 percent of the minimum credits requirements for the degree, on the recommendations of Equivalence Committee provided that: The contents of the course(s) for which credit is claimed, are identical or similar to the course included in her planned course work and the courses for which credit is claimed have not been used for another degree.
- 12.6 A course studied to qualify a degree will not be taken/ considered for any other and higher degree program.
- 12.7 Credit earned for a course shall lapse on the expiry of five years for regular student and seven years for part time student from the end of the semester in which the course was qualified. The Vice Chancellor may revalidate the lapsed courses for special reasons to be recorded.
- 12.8 No course shall carry more than 4 credits.

13. EXAMINATIONS:

- 13.1 Examination Fee: University examination fee shall be charged at the time of enrollment of each semester.
- 13.2 Tests and Examinations:
- a) There shall be two examinations 'mid and final' in each semester. In addition to these examinations the teacher shall give home assignments and quizzes etc. to the students. The mode of these examinations will be left to the teacher, who will be solely responsible for the conduct of examination as well as evaluation in her course. The grade awarded in the course by the teacher shall be final.
- b) Only those students, who have at least 75% attendance in theory and practical classes (where applicable) separately in each course, shall be eligible to appear in the final examination.

- c) A teacher shall report to the Dean/Coordinator/Director/Principal concerned through the Chairperson of the respective Department the names of students who are absent from the lectures/ practical's (where applicable) continuously for seven days to enable the office of the Dean/Coordinator to strike off names of such students. The student may be readmitted under the university rules or may be refused admission if the reasons provided for readmission are not convincing.
- 13.3 Final examination: The final examination for a semester shall be held on a schedule notified by the teacher in advance.
- 13.4 The answer scripts of each examination shall be discussed with the students.
- a) The mid-semester examination shall be held during 9th week of the semester which shall carry 30 percent of the total allocated marks for the course. This examination shall be conducted by the teacher concerned who shall proceed according to the University rules.
- b) For the purpose of evaluation, one credit will carry 20 marks e.g. a four credits course will carry 80 marks. These marks will be divided in accordance with the credits assigned to theory and practical (where applicable) for each course.
- c) The following weightage shall be given to the examinations, home assignments, etc
- d) Student have to appear separately in Mid-term, Final Term and Practical Examination in each course. If a student fails to appear in anyone of the above mentioned examinations, then she will be considered fail in that course.

(a) Mid-semester examination	30%
(b) Home assignments / quizzes, presentations etc	20%
(c) Final examination	50%

(Fraction in total marks of a course will be rounded to the nearest to one decimal point)

- 13.5 To qualify a course, it is essential to pass separately in the theory and practical (where applicable) examinations with aggregation to be at least 40 percent.
- 13.6 The teacher shall send the final award list along with answer scripts of mid, final and practical (where applicable) of the course to the office of the Controller of Examinations within 10 days after the end of a semester. The Dean/Coordinator may condone the delay in result submission. A soft copy of the award list should also be sent to the office of the Director/Principal/ Chairperson and the Dean/Coordinator concerned.
- 13.7 On receipt of the award lists, the Controller of Examinations shall notify the results and send copies to the office of the Dean/Coordinator, Director/Principal and the Chairperson/ Incharge of the concerned Department.

14.1 Grade point and equivalence between letter grading and numerical grading shall be as follows:

- 14.2 If a student fails to obtain CGPA of 1.75 at the end of each Academics year (after three consecutive Fall, Spring and Summer Semesters) her admission shall stand cancelled. However the student may seek fresh admission.
- 14.3 Student is allowed to improve her D grades in any course of previous semesters during her course of study but only once.

A student, who obtains CGPA of 1.75 or more but less than 2.50 upon the completion of entire approved course work may be allowed to repeat once the courses of the previous semesters in which the students had obtained the lowest grades in order to improve the CGPA so as to obtain the minimum of 2.50, failing which the students shall cease to be on the rolls. A student is allowed to improve only those number of D grades required to get 2.50 CGPA for obtaining her degree, failing which the students shall cease to be on the rolls provided that she has availed the maximum permissible repetitions.

CGPA of 2.5 out of 4.0 is required to qualify for the award of degree.

15. General:

- 15.1 Office of the Dean/Coordinator will maintain student record for 3 years after the declaration of final result. After that period, the record may be disposed off with the permission of the Vice Chancellor.
- 15.2 Office of the Controller of Examinations shall keep scripts of student's examinations for whole session (4 years).
- 15.3 The minimum number of students to start a class is 15.

However, the Competent Authority may grant approval to start a class which is not fulfilling the above-mentioned number in special cases during regular and summer semesters. The policy is not applicable for the fail/re-sit students improving the lower grades.

1. MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION:

The medium of instructions and examinations shall be English (Except Faculty of Islamic and Oriental learning, which shall be in Urdu or their subject language).

2. Degree Completion Timeline:

- 2.1 The duration for the Degrees of MS/M. Phil or equivalent is 2 to 4 years in full residence and not less than six and more than eight semesters for the University employees admitted as part time students.
- 2.2 In case a student is unable to secure an MS/MPhil within the prescribed timeframe and claims for extension in duration, the university may constitute appropriate authority and determine the causes of delay. In the event of force majeure (i.e., delay on account of circumstance beyond the control of student), the university may grant an extension in the period of award of MS/MPhil degree in accordance with the duration limiting factor(s) and shall also take corrective measures in case the delay is caused by process or administrative reasons.
- 2.3 The employees of the government/ other agencies nominated for MS/M.Phil degree at this University shall have to take study leave to pursue studies as a regular student, failing which she will not be admitted. However, after getting admission by a nominee in the university, it would be obligatory for the parent department to sanction the study leave or extension in the leave in favour of the nominee within one semester failing which, her admission shall stand cancelled.

3. DURATION OF THE SEMESTER:

There shall be 2 semesters (Fall and Spring) of 18 weeks in each Academics year. The commencement of semesters shall be regulated by the Academics Council (Explanation: Out of 18 weeks, 16 weeks shall be actual teaching time. The rest may be utilized for enrollment, conduct of examinations and declaration of results, etc.)

4. SCHEME OF STUDY:

The subjects of study for the degree programs are given in SCHEDULE II (Course Detail) which may be amended from time to time. A student shall present an acceptable thesis in addition to completing her approved course work in order to qualify for the award of the degree

5. MINIMUM REQUIREMENT FOR THE VARIOUS DEGREE PROGRAMMES:

A student admitted to the degree program shall be required to take minimum 24 credits (excluding 06 credits for thesis research). Deficiency course(s) shall not be counted toward the minimum credit hours requirement.

6. ROUTING OF Academics MATTERS:

All the Academics matters shall be routed through proper channel i.e. through the Chairperson /Incharge of the Department/Director and Principal/Dean/Coordinator of the college/faculty concerned.

7. DEFICIENCY COURSES:

If the course(s) studied by a candidate in her previous degree (on the basis of which admission is requested) do not provide adequate background for the degree program of study, she may be required to make up the deficiency by taking additional course(s) as determined by the respective Departmental Board of Studies.

8. UNIVERSITY EMPLOYEE:

The Academics Staff: A teacher / researcher of the GCW University Faisalabad (regular) may be allowed to enroll herself for post graduate courses after getting permission from the Competent Authority. She under this arrangement will be a part time student and a full time employee. She will be allowed to enroll maximum of two courses and one Seminar or Special Problem. The minimum residential period required for part time MS/MPhil student shall be six semesters with a maximum limit of 8 semesters for completion of degree; Of these for the first 4 semesters, fifty percent of total fee (except registration fee, admission fee, examination fee, library security) shall be charged. After four semesters, full fee/dues shall be charged from them as regular students.

In case, she intends to take maximum credit hours allowed to a full time student then she will have to take study leave from the University and pay full dues.

Administrative Staff: The administrative staff(only female) of the GCW University Faisalabad (regular) will be treated at par for admission to various post graduate courses under evening programme after getting permission from the Competent Authority under prescribed rules of the University. She will be allowed to enroll the maximum of two courses, one seminar or special problem. The minimum residential period required for part time MS/MPhil student shall be six semesters with a maximum limit of 8 semesters for completion of degree; Of these for the first 4 semesters, fifty percent of total fee (except registration fee, admission fee, examination fee, library security) shall be charged. After four semesters, full fee/dues shall be charged from them as regular students. She under this arrangement will be a part time student and a full time employee.

In case, she intends to take maximum credit hours or take morning course, she will have to take leave from the university and pay full dues. However, the number of seats for admission to various degree programs for administrative staff might be fixed by the Vice Chancellor.

9. ENROLLMENT:

- 9.1 An application for enrollment on the prescribed Course Registration Form
- 9.2 (GS-10) accompanied by proof of fee payment (bank receipt) shall be presented to the office of the Director Academics on the day(s) notified for enrollment.
- 9.3 The Director Academics under special circumstances and on payment of late fee of Rs.500/- may permit a student to enroll within ten days after the commencement of the classes.
- 9.4 The Vice Chancellor may allow a student to enroll till the last day of the 4th week after the commencement of classes, with double late fee of Rs.1000/-.
- 9.5 Enrollment in absentia is not allowed. Student is required to be present in person with a proof of identification (University Identity Card or Computerized National Identity Card etc.) for enrollment.
- 9.6 Enrollment shall only be considered complete when Course Registration Form is submitted to the office of the Director Academics. Depositing of fee only will not serve the purpose
- 9.7 A candidate admitted to a degree program shall, so long as she has not submitted thesis, have to enroll for each semester.
- 9.8 The students who enroll extra semesters beyond their minimum residential requirement (four semesters) will have to pay full semester fee for each and every extra semester

10. REVISION OF COURSE REGISTRATION FORM:

- 10.1 A student may be permitted to revise her Course Registration Form (GS-10) within 20 days from the commencement of classes. After this period she may be allowed to revise Course Registration Form up to 28th day from the commencement of classes on payment of Rs.1, 000/- as Course Registration Form revision fee.
- 10.2 The students of first semester may be allowed to revise their Course Registration Form (GS-10) within 30 days of the last date of enrollment without fine.

11. DISCONTINUATION/FREEZE OF STUDY/SEMESTER

- 11.1 A student may discontinue an enrolled semester before appearing in the final examination with the permission of the Vice Chancellor obtained through the Registrar on the recommendations of the Chairperson/Incharge/Director/Principal and Dean/Coordinator, on account of sickness duly certified by the MS DHQ Hospital or due to Circumstances beyond her control, subject to fulfillment of condition that the student has passed the final examination of previous semester with minimum prescribed GPA/CGPA required for the said degree program.
- 11.2 The facility of discontinuation can be availed only once during the whole degree program.
- 11.3 A candidate shall not ordinarily be allowed to discontinue studies during the first semester.
- 11.4 A student, permitted to discontinue is required to resume her studies from the next semester on the recommendation of Chairperson / charge/Director/ Principal/Dean/Coordinator concerned and notified by the Director Academics.
- 11.5 During the semester freeze, bonafide status of the student shall remain suspended. She will not be entitled to avail any privilege as that of a regular student.
- 11.6 An HEC fellowship awardee will be allowed to join a training program with the condition that her training would not disturb her enrollment in the University and will remain intact. On her return and rejoining the University, she would have to meet the enrollment formalities (Ex-post-facto) of this period (the whole period of HEC scholarship) and it would also be included in the period of residential requirements of the scholar.

12. RE-ADMISSION

- 12.1 If a student fails to enroll in any semester(s) without permission of the Competent Authority, she shall cease to be on the rolls of the University and in case she desires re-admission; she shall have to apply for the same.
- 12.2 The office of the Director Academics on the recommendation of the Dean/Coordinator may re-admit such a candidate subject to the payment of Rs. 5,000/- as re-admission fee in addition to the regular semester fee. Re-admission will be allowed only if a student can maintain 75% attendance in the admitted semester.
- 12.3 The Dean/Coordinator may refuse the re-admission if the reasons presented are not convincing. Note: The period of gap semester will not be counted towards residential requirements.

SUPERVISORY COMMITTEE 13.

- (a) The Supervisory Committee of a student shall be proposed by the respective Board of Studies of the Department/Institute during 1st semes-13.1 ter.
- (b) Supervisory Committee shall consist of two teachers from the major field of study and one from the minor/elective field of study. However, if an outstanding specialist in a major or minor/elective field of study is available outside the University, She may be taken as a member of the Supervisory Committee in place of a teacher or as an additional member.
- (c) Supervisor of the student will act as Chairperson of the Supervisory Committee.
- (d) Supervisory committee proposed by the respective Board of Studies and recommended by the Chairperson /In charge/Director of the Institute/ Principal and Dean/Coordinator of the faculty concerned, shall be approved by the Board of Academics and Research and notified by the Director Academics.
- (e) Supervisory Committee may be revised according to the regulation (13.1 (a) to (d)) with the reasons of change to be recorded.
- In case, a student duly recommended by the Chairperson/Incharge and Dean/Coordinator/Director/ Principal concerned to conduct her complete/part of thesis research in other institution/laboratory, is allowed by the Director Academics the helping scientist may be taken as Co-supervisor/ special member on the Supervisory Committee of the student. However, the University will not bear any financial liability in this context.
- The Professor Emeritus may act as Supervisor/member of Supervisory Committee of postgraduate students if he/she is stationed at Faisalabad.
- Foreign Faculty members, HEC National Professors/HEC Eminent Scientists may act as Supervisor/member of the Supervisory Committee provided that they are appointed at this University for three years.
- Retired teachers of the GCW University Faisalabad may continue as Supervisor/member of the Supervisory Committee to their previous postgraduate students if they had supervised the student up to the approval of the synopsis. However, on re-employment for three years they may be given supervision of a new student.
- Adhoc/contract teachers may act as Supervisor/member of the Supervisory Committee only where there is shortage of regular faculty members. Faculty on Tenure Track System (TTS) / Interim Placement of Fresh PhD Program (IPFP) will be considered as regular faculty for the subject purpose.

COURSE OF STUDY 14.

- All post-graduate courses will be designated an appropriate course code and will be preceded by the suitable alphabets indicating the name of 14.1 the respective department.
- A full time student can enroll up to 15 credit hours in a semester. However, the Vice Chancellor may relax enrollment up to 1 extra course for a 14.2 semester.
- Out of the total number of credits referred to the Regulation 5, only one credit each shall be earned through Seminar and Special Problem. 14.3
- A course can be repeated three times (enrolled four times) at the most. The Controller of Examinations office will mention corresponding repetitions in the result notification and the student shall mention repetition status in the Course Registration Form

- **14.5** Credit Transfer, Evaluation and Grading: The Board of Academics and Research, may consider credit hours earned by a student at another HEC recognized institution, subject to a maximum of 50 percent of the minimum credit hour requirements for the degree, on the recommendations of Equivalence Committee provided that:
- a. The contents of the course(s) for which credit is claimed, are identical or similar to the course included in her planned course work.
- b. The course for which credit is claimed should not have been used for any other degree c. Courses with less than B grade shall not be considered for transfer of credit hours.
- 14.6 Students would submit their Course Work during first semester and Synopsis should be approved by the 3rd semester of their program of study.
- 14.7 A course studied to qualify a degree will not be taken / considered for any other higher degree program.
- 14.8 Credit earned for a course shall lapse on the expiry of five years for regular student and seven years for part time student from the end of the semester in which the course was qualified. The Board of Academics and Research may revalidate the lapsed courses for special reasons to be recorded. Explanation: Deficiency course once qualified will not lapse and shall not be called in question again and need not to be revalidated.
- 14.9 No course shall carry more than 4 credit hours.

15. Examinations:

15.1 Examination Fee: University examination fee shall be charged at the time of enrollment of each semester.

15.2 Tests and Examinations:

- a) There shall be two examinations mid and final in each semester. In addition to these examinations the teacher shall give home assignments and quizzes etc. to the students. The form of these examinations will be left to the teacher who will be solely responsible for the conduct of examination as well as evaluation in her course. The grade given in the course by the teacher shall be final.
- b) Only those students, who have at least 75% attendance in theory and practical separately in each course, shall be eligible to appear in the final examination.
- c) A teacher shall report to the Dean/Coordinator/Director/Principal concerned through the Chairperson/Incharge of the concerned department the names of students who are absent from the lectures/practical's continuously for seven days to enable Director Academics to strike off the names of such students. She may be re-admitted under the University rules or refused admission if the reasons given for readmission are not convincing enough.
- 15.3 The final examination for a semester shall be held on a date, time and place to be notified by the department in advance.
- 15.4 To pass a deficiency course, a student is required to obtain at least "C" grade.
- 15.5 The scripts of each examination shall be discussed with the students.
- 15.6 The mid-semester examination shall be held during 9th week of the semester which shall carry 30 percent of the total marks allocated for the course. This examination shall be held by the teacher concerned who shall determine the form of the examination.
- 15.7 For the purpose of evaluation, one credit hour will carry 20 marks e.g. a four credit course will carry 80 marks. These marks will be divided in accordance with the credits assigned to theory and practical for each course.

15.8 The following weightage shall be given to the examinations and home assignments;

(a) Mid-semester examination 30%

(b) Home assignments, quizzes, presentations etc. 20%

(c) Final examination 50% Total: 100%

(Fraction in total marks of a course will be rounded to the nearest to one decimal point)

- d) Student have to appear separately in Mid term, Final Term and Practical Examination in each course. If a student fails to appear anyone of the above mentioned examination, then she will be considered fail in that course.
- **15.9** The duration of examination shall be as under;

Mid-Semester Examination One hour

Final Examination Two to three hours

- 15.10 Final examination covering the full syllabus with at least 25% of the course of mid-semester as well shall be held at the end of each semester.
- 15.11 Question paper for the mid and final semester examination shall be set by the respective teacher. However, Chairperson/Incharge/Dean/Coordinator /Principal/Director shall ensure the quality and standard of the question paper set by the teacher.
- 15.12 To qualify a course, it is essential to pass separately in the theory and practical examinations.
- 15.13 The teacher shall send the final award list along with answer sheets of mid, final and practical for the course to the office of the Controller of Examinations within 10 days after the end of a semester. The Vice Chancellor may condone the delay in result submission. A soft copy of the award list should also be sent to the office of the Chairperson Incharge/Director/Principal of the College & Director Academics.
- 15.14 On receipt of the award lists, the Controller of Examinations shall notify the results and send copies to the Director Academics, Dean/Coordinator/Director/Principal and the Chairperson/Inharge of the Departments concerned.

16. GRADE POINT AVERAGE

16.1 Grade point and Equivalence between letter grading and numerical grading shall be as follows:

- 16.2 If a student fails to obtain CGPA of 2.50 at the end of each Academics year (Fall, Spring and Summer) her admission shall stand cancelled. However she may seek fresh admission as and when the University offers. Notes: The student who avails only one regular semester (Fall or Spring) must obtain GPA of 2.50 at the end of the same Academics year to remain on roll.
- 16.3 A student, who obtains CGPA of 2.50 or more but less than 3.00 upon the completion of entire approved course work, may be allowed to repeat once the course(s) of the previous semesters in which she obtained the lowest grades in order to improve the CGPA so as to obtain the minimum of 3.00 failing which she shall cease to be on the rolls. The student is only allowed to submit her thesis when she has attained CGPA 3.00 in her approved course work (Theory + Practical).

A student is allowed to improve only those number of C grades required to get 3 CGPA for obtaining her degree, failing which the students shall cease to be on the rolls provided that she has availed the maximum permissible repetitions.

CGPA of 3.00 out of 4.00 is required to qualify for the award of degree.

17. THESIS EXAMINATION

- 17.1 Thesis must be submitted latest by the 60 days grace period after the closing date of the semester or any date announced by the Director Academics with the permission of the Competent Authority as otherwise candidate admitted to a degree program shall so long as she has not submitted thesis, has to enroll for next semester.
- 17.2 The thesis shall be completed according to the guidelines approved by the Board of Academics and Research and shall be submitted to the office of the Director Academics according to the schedule announced by the DAS for Semifinal and Final thesis.
- 17.3 The thesis duly certified by the Supervisory Committee that the contents and form of the thesis are satisfactory for submission shall be sent to the External Examiner by the office of the Controller of Examinations (CE) for evaluation. A panel of three examiners per student shall be submitted to the CE office by the Chairperson of the respective Board of Studies on or before the submission of thesis.
- 17.4 The thesis shall be evaluated by a Board of Examiners comprising members of the Supervisory Committee and one External Examiner appointed by the Vice Chancellor from the panel of names recommended by the Board of Studies. At least three members of the Boards of Examiners of whom one must be an external examiner shall "for the purpose of evaluating the thesis," hold a viva voce examination and such other tests as they consider necessary. The External Examiner shall be given reasonable time to go through the contents of the thesis critically. The viva voce examination would be conducted at least one week after of the receipt of thesis by the External Examiner.
- 17.4.1 There shall be 120 marks corresponding to 6 credit hours allocated for thesis.
- 17.4.2 Total marks so awarded will be converted into a letter grade as prescribed in regulation No. 16.1 and average grades on the basis of course work and thesis will then be worked out to calculate the final CGPA.
- 17.4.3 The thesis evaluation will be conducted within six months from the date of dispatch of thesis from the Controller of Examinations to the quarter concerned failing which the student will be declared/assumed fail in the thesis examination and shall be notified by the office of the Controller of Examinations. However, the Vice Chancellor may allow extension for thesis evaluation up to one year in hardship cases.
- 17.4.4 The thesis evaluation should be completed within six months from the date of submission of thesis to the Controller of Examination: The Controller of Examination shall get the approval of the two external examiners (one as an alternative in case of regret of the examiner) from the Vice Chancellor and thesis shall be dispatched.

- **17.4.6** The Supervisor after consultation with external examiner shall write to the Controller Examinations for notifying the date, time and venue of thesis evaluation.
- 17.4.6 The Supervisor shall send the award list of thesis examination after counter signature of the Chairperson to the office of the Controller of Examinations after making sure that the student has incorporated the suggested improvements. The Controller of Examinations shall notify the result of the student after receiving three bound copies of thesis.
- 17.4.7 Original Plagiarism report along with the Certificate from Supervisor and Declaration by the student must be submitted while submitting the thesis to the Directorate of Academics. The Directorate of Academics shall notify the dates for the semifinal and final phases of thesis submission
- 17.4.8 The colour of hard bound cover of M.Phil. Program should be maroon with title superimposed in golden.
- 17.5 In case of disagreement between the Supervisory Committee and the External Examiner regarding the acceptance of the thesis it shall be referred to another external examiner, with the due approval of the Competent Authority (the Vice Chancellor), whose decision shall be final.
- 17.6 If a candidate fails in the thesis examination, she may enroll again and will submit a revised thesis within six months after the date of declaration of the result of the last thesis examination, on payment of the prescribed thesis examination fee. She can avail this chance only once.
- 17.7 If the thesis, submitted by a candidate for final evaluation, is proved to be copied/ plagiarized at the time of viva-voce examination, it will be liable to be rejected on the report of Board of Examiners and the Controller of Examinations will declare the candidate fail in thesis examination. The admission of such candidate shall be cancelled and she shall not be readmitted under any circumstances.
- 17.8 If the thesis of a candidate is proved to be plagiarized after its evaluation and declaration of result, previous result of the candidate will be cancelled and she will be declared as fail in thesis examination. Such a candidate shall not be re-admitted to M.Phil. under any circumstances

18. GENERAL

- 18.1 Thes tudents who enroll extra semesters beyond their minimum residential requirement will not be allowed hostel accommodation.
- 18.2 After submission of the thesis, the students will not be allowed to stay in the University hostels.
- 18.3 Directorate of Academics will maintain student record for 3 years after the declaration of final result. After that period, the record may be disposed of with the permission of the Vice Chancellor.
- 18.4 Office of the Controller of Examinations shall keep scripts of students' examinations for one semester.
- 18.5 The minimum number of students to start a class is as under:

However, the Competent Authority may grant approval to start a class which is not fulfilling the above-mentioned number in special cases during regular and summer semesters. The policy is not applicable for the fail /re-sit students and the students improving the lower grades.

1. MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION:

The medium of instruction and examinations shall be English (Except Faculty of Humanities and Languages, which shall be in Urdu or their relevant subject language)..

2. DURATION OF THE COURSE:

- 2.1 The duration for the Degree of PhD shall be 3 to 8 years in full residence as well as for the university employee admitted as part time students.
- 2.2 The employees of the government/ other agencies nominated for Ph.D. degree at this University shall have to take study leave to pursue studies as a regular student, failing which she shall not be admitted. However, after getting admission by a nominee in the university, it would be obligatory for the parent department to sanction the study leave or extension in the leave in favour of the nominee within one semester failing which her admission shall stand cancelled.

3. DURATION OF THE SEMESTER:

There shall be 2 semesters (Fall and Spring) of 18 weeks each in an Academics year. The commencement of semesters shall be regulated by the Academics Council.(Explanation: Out of 18 weeks, 16 weeks shall be actual teaching time; the rest may be utilized for enrollment, conduct of examinations and declaration of results, etc.)

4. SUBJECTS OF STUDY:

The subjects of study for the degree programs are given in schedule –III, which may be amended from time to time. A student shall present an acceptable thesis in addition to completing her approved course work and comprehensive examination in order to qualify for the award of the degree.

5. COURSEWORK AND RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT:

- 5.1 A student admitted to the PhD degree program shall take minimum 22 credit hours followed by Comprehensive Examination. She will have to defend PhD synopsis and thesis. Deficiency course(s) shall not be counted toward the minimum credit hours requirement.
- 5.2 Public thesis Defence is mandatory. The University will notify in advance the date, time and venue of the event.
- 5.3 PhD degree should be based on research, not only on credit hours.

6. ROUTING OF Academics MATTERS:

All the Academics matters should be routed through the proper channel i.e. through the Chairperson /Incharge of the Department/Director and Principal /Dean/Coordinator of the faculty concerned.

7. **DEFICIENCY COURSES:**

If the course(s) studied by a candidate in her previous degree (on the basis of which admission is requested) does not provide adequate background for the degree program of study, she may be required to makeup the deficiency by taking additional courses as determined by the respective departmental Board of Studies.

8. UNIVERSITY EMPLOYEES:

8.1 The Academics Staff: A teacher / researcher of the GCW University Faisalabad (regular) may be allowed to enroll herself for post graduate courses after getting permission from the competent authority under prescribed rules of the university. She under this arrangement will be a part time student and a full time employee. She will be allowed to enroll maximum of two courses and one seminar or special problem. The minimum residential period for part time PhD student shall be 8 semesters with a maximum limit of 14 semesters for completion of degree; Of these for the first 4 semesters, fifty percent of total fee (except registration fee, admission fee, examination fee, library security) shall be charged. After four semesters, full fee/dues shall be charged for them as regular students.

In case she intends to take maximum credit hours allowed to a full time student then she will have to take study leave from the University as per rules and pay full dues.

8.2 Administrative Staff: The administrative staff (only female) of the GCW University Faisalabad (regular) will be treated at per for admission to various post graduate courses under evening program after getting permission from the Competent Authority under prescribed rules of the University. She will take maximum of two courses, one seminar or special problem. The minimum residential period for part time PhD student shall be 8 semesters with a maximum limit of 14 semesters for completion of degree; Of these for the first 4 semesters, fifty percent of total fee (except registration fee, admission fee, examination fee, library security) shall be charged. After four semesters, full fee/dues shall be charged for them as regular students.

She under this arrangement will be a part time student and a fulltime employee. In case, she intends to take maximum credit hours or take morning course, she will have to take study leave from the university as per rules and pay full dues. However, the number of seats for admission to various degree programs for administrative staff might be fixed by the Vice Chancellor.

9. ENROLLMENT

- 9.1 An application for enrollment on the prescribed form (Course Registration Form, GS-10), accompanied by proof of fee payment (bank receipt) shall be presented to the office of the Director Academics on the day(s) notified for enrollment.
- 9.2 The Director Academics under special circumstances and on payment of late fee prescribed for this purpose may permit a student to enroll within ten days after the commencement of the classes.
- 9.3 The Vice Chancellor may allow a student to be enrolled till the last day of the 4th week after the commencement of classes under special circumstances, in individual cases and for reasons to be recorded, with double late fee prescribed for this purpose.
- 9.4 Enrollment in absentia is not allowed. Student is required to be present in person with a proof of identification (University Identity Card or Computerized National Identity Card etc.) for enrollment.
- 9.5 Enrollment will only be considered complete when Course Registration Form (GS-10) is submitted to the office of the Director, Academics. Only depositing of fee will not serve the purpose.
- 9.6 A candidate admitted to a degree program shall so long as she has not submitted thesis, has to enroll for each semester.

10. DISCONTINUATION / FREEZING OF STUDY / SEMESTER

- 10.1 A student may discontinue enrolled semester before appearing in the final examination with the permission of the Vice Chancellor obtained through the Registrar on the recommendations of the Dean/Coordinator/Director / Principal because of sickness duly certified by the University Medical Officer or due to any circumstances beyond her control.
- 10.2 The facility of discontinuation can be availed only once during the whole degree program.
- 10.3 A student so permitted to discontinue is required to resume her studies from next semester on the recommendation of Chairperson/Incharge/Director/ Principal/ Dean/Coordinator concerned and notified by the Director Academics.
- 10.4 A Candidate shall not ordinarily be allowed to discontinue studies during the first semester
- 10.5 During the semester freeze, bonafide status of the student shall remain suspended. She will not be entitled to avail any privilege as that of a regular student.
- 10.6 An HEC fellowship awardee will be allowed to join a training program with the condition that her training would not disturb her enrollment in the University and will remain intact. On her returning and rejoining the University, she would have to meet the enrollment formalities (Ex-post-facto) of this period (the whole period of HEC scholarship) and it would also be included in the period of residential requirements of the scholar.

11. RE-ADMISSION

- 11.1 If a student fails to enroll in any semester(s) without permission of the Competent Authority, she shall cease to be on the rolls of the University and in case she desires readmission, she shall have to apply for re-admission.
- 11.2 The office of Director Academics on the recommendation of the Dean/Coordinator and by the permission of the Competent Authority may re-admit such a candidate subject to payment of Rs.5000/- as readmission fee in addition to the regular semester fee. Re-admission will be allowed only if a student can maintain 75% attendance in the admitted semester.
- 11.3 The Dean/Coordinator may refuse the re-admission if the reasons presented are not convincing. Note: The period of gap semester will not be counted towards residential requirements.

12. SUPERVISORY COMMITTEE

- 12.1 (a) The Supervisory Committee of a student shall be proposed by the respective Board of Studies of the Department/Institute during 1st semester.
- (b) Supervisory Committee shall consist of two teachers from the major field of study and one from the minor/elective field of study. However, if an outstanding specialist in a major or minor/elective field of study is available outside the University, she may be taken as a member of the Supervisory Committee in place of a teacher or as an additional member.(c) Supervisor of the student will act as Chairperson of the Supervisory Committee.
- (d) Supervisory Committee proposed by the respective Board of Studies and recommended by the Chairperson / Incharge/Director of the Institute/ Principal and Dean/Coordinator of the faculty concerned, shall be approved by the Board of Advanced Studies and Research and notified by the Director Academics.
- (e) Supervisory Committee may be revised according to the regulation (12.1 (a) to (d)) with the reasons of change to be recorded.

- 12.2 In case, a student duly recommended by the Chairperson/Incharge and Dean/Coordinator/Director/ Principal concerned to conduct her complete/part of thesis research in other institution/laboratory, is allowed by the Director Academics. The helping scientist may be taken as Supervisor-II/ Special Member on the Supervisory Committee of the student. However, the university will not bear any financial liability in this context.
- 12.3 The Professor Emeritus may act as Supervisor/member of Supervisory Committee of postgraduate students if she is stationed at Faisalabad.
- **12.4** Foreign Faculty members, HEC National Professors/HEC Eminent Scientists may act as Supervisor/member of the Supervisory Committee provided that they are appointed at this University for three years.
- 12.5 Retired teachers of the GCW University Faisalabad may continue as Supervisor/member of the Supervisory Committee to their previous post-graduate students if they had supervised the student up to the approval of the synopsis. However, on re-employment for three years they may be given supervision of a new student.
- 12.6 Adhoc/contract teachers may act as Supervisor/member of the Supervisory Committee only where there is a shortage of regular faculty members. Faculty on Tenure Track System (TTS) / Interim Placement of Fresh Ph.D Program (IPFP) will be considered as regular faculty for the subject purpose.
- 12.7 HEC rules shall be followed for allowing the maximum number of Ph.D. students under one supervisor, which states as under;
- a) The maximum number of Ph.D. students under the supervision of a full time faculty member, will normally be 5 which may be increased to 8 under special circumstances in teaching departments subject to the prior approval of the Higher Education Commission.
- b) Eminent faculty/scientists such as HEC Distinguished Professors, Fellow of Royal Societies (FRS) and those who have cumulative impact factor of 100 or more can supervise as many Ph.D. students as they wish.

13. REVISION OF REGISTERED COURSE

- 13.1 A student may be permitted to revise her Course Registration Form (GS-10) within 20 days from the commencement of classes. After this period, she may be allowed to revise Course Registration Form up to 28th day from the commencement of classes on payment of Rs.1,000/- as Course Registration Form (GS-10) revision fee.
- 13.2 The students of first semester may be allowed to revise their Course Registration Form (GS-10) within 30 days of the last date of enrollment without any fee.

14. COURSE OF STUDY

- 14.1 All post-graduate courses will be designated an appropriate course code and will be preceded by the suitable alphabets indicating the name of the respective department.
- 14.2 A full time student can enroll up to 15 credit hours in a semester. However, the Vice Chancellor may relax enrollment up to 1 extra course for a semester.
- 14.3 Out of the total number of credits referred to the Regulation 5.1, only two credit hours each shall be earned through Seminar and one through Special Problem. Out of these two seminars, one should relate to the subject of her research and should be delivered at the time of preparation of synopsis, at university level.
- 14.4 A course can be repeated three times (enrolled four times) at the most. The Controller of Examinations office will mention corresponding repetitions in the result notification and the student shall mention repetition status in the Course Registration Form (GS-10)

- 14.5 Transfer of Credits: The Director Academics, may consider credits earned by a student at another HEC recognized institution, subject to a maximum of 50 per cent of the minimum credit hours requirements for the degree, on the recommendations of Equivalence Committee provided that:
- a) The contents of the course(s) for which credit is claimed, are identical or similar to the course included in her planned course work program.
- b) The course for which credit is claimed has not been used for any other degree.
- c) Courses with less than B grade shall not be considered for transfer of credits.
- 14.6 Students would submit their Course Work Program during first semester and Synopsis during the 4thsemester of their program of study.
- 14.7 A course studied to qualify a degree will not be taken / considered for any other higher degree program.
- 14.8 Credit earned for a course shall lapse on the expiry of five years for regular students and seven years for part time students from the end of the semester in which the course was qualified. The Vice Chancellor may revalidate the lapsed courses for special reasons to be recorded. Explanation: Deficiency course once qualified will not lapse and shall not be called in question again and need not to be revalidated.
- **14.9** No course shall carry more than 4 credits.

- 15.9 The duration of examination shall be as under;

- 15.10 Final examination covering the full syllabus with at least 25% of the course of mid-semester as well shall be held at the end of each semester.
- 15.11 Question paper for the mid and final semester examinations shall be set by the respective teacher. However, Chairperson/Incharge/Principal/Director/Dean/Coordinator shall ensure the quality and standard of the question paper set by the teacher.
- 15.12 To qualify a course, it is essential to pass separately in the theory and practical examinations.
- 15.13 The teacher shall send the final award list along with answer sheets of mid, final and practical for the course to the office of the Controller of Examinations within 10 days after the end of a semester. The Vice Chancellor may condone the delay in result submission. A soft copy of the award list should also be sent to the office of the Chairperson/Incharge/Dean/Coordinator/Director/Principal of the College & Director Academics.
- 15.14 On receipt of the award lists, the Controller of Examinations shall notify the results and send copies to the Director Academics, Dean/Coordinator/Director/Principal and the Chairperson/Incharge of the Departments concerned.

16. GRADE POINT AVERAGE

16.1 Grade point and Equivalence between letter grading and numerical grading shall be as follows:

16.2 If a student fails to obtain 3.0 CGPA at the end of each Academics year (Fall, Spring and Summer) her admission shall stand cancelled. However she may seek fresh admission.

Note: The student who avails only one regular semester (Fall/Spring) must obtain 3.0 GPA at the end of the same Academics year to remain on roll.

17. COMPREHENSIVE EXAMINATION

- 17.1 The required coursework, comprehensive exam, and defense of synopsis/research proposals should be completed within the 1st six semesters of the registration into a PhD program. The responsibility in this regard rests collectively with the PhD student and the university. In case of non-compliance, the registration shall be cancelled and transcripts for completion of coursework may be issued to the student.
- 17.2. In an event of force majeure i.e., noncompliance on account of circumstances beyond the control of student, the university may consider the matter in accordance with the procedure prescribed as under; In case a student is unable to secure an PhD. within the prescribed timeframe and claims for extension in duration, the university may constitute appropriate authority and determine the causes of delay. In the event of force majeure (i.e., delay on account of circumstance beyond the control of student), the university may grant an extension in the period of award of PhD. degree in accordance with the duration limiting factor(s) and shall also take corrective measures in case the delay is caused by process or administrative reasons.

(Explanation: The comprehensive examination shall be arranged within 12 weeks while the date, time and venue of examination shall be notified within first week of the termination of each regular semester. A student will have to apply for comprehensive examination on the prescribed form at least four weeks before the examination. If a student does not apply within the specified period or does not appear in the examination, she will be deemed to have availed one chance and failed to qualify in the first attempt).

- 17.3 The comprehensive examination will cover the complete course work and shall consist of a written part followed by an oral part. It will be designed to ascertain whether the student has attained the breadth of knowledge and the intellectual maturity necessary to become a successful scholar in her chosen discipline. It will not be a mere re-examination of previous courses but will test the students' ability to integrate and assimilate the knowledge obtained from the courses, seminars and independent studies.
- 17.4 A student has to apply on the prescribed form for comprehensive examination to the office of the Director Academics (for 1st and 2nd attempts). In case the student does not apply/appear in the examination, her chance will lapse.
- 17.5 If a student does not qualify written comprehensive examination, she shall be eligible to re-appear again but only once and within two semesters from the date of the declaration of the result of the examination.
- 17.6 A student who has passed the comprehensive examination shall be deemed to have become a candidate for admission to Ph.D. degree **COMPREHENSIVE EXAMINATION (WRITTEN)**
- 17.6 The Controller of Examinations shall, with the approval of the Vice Chancellor, notify the date, time and venue of the examination at least two weeks before the commencement of the examination
- 17.7 Examiners for the written comprehensive examination shall be appointed by the Vice Chancellor, processed through Controller of Examinations office from a panel of examiners (three for each paper) proposed by respective Board of Studies. The number of papers shall be three.
- 17.8 Each member shall, within seven days after the receipt of the answer books, return them duly marked to the Controller of Examinations along with the award list.

- 17.9 To pass the written examination a student must secure 65% marks in each paper separately.
- 17.10 If a student fails in two or more papers, she will be re-examined in all the papers. In case a student fails in one paper, she can re-appear only in the failed paper but only once within two semesters.

18. THESIS SUBMISSION AND Defence

After qualifying the comprehensive examination (written) a student has to defend her PhD synopsis following the under mentioned procedure

- When the student is prepared to defend her synopsis (after synopsis scrutiny), the concerned supervisor will approach the Chairperson/Incharge of her department for the same.
- The Chairperson/ Inchagre will notify the time, date and venue of the synopsis Defence along with the Name of student and title of the synopsis.
- The copies of the notification are to be sent to the Vice Chancellor, Coordinator of the faculty, inations and Notice Board (for all interested students).
- All PhD synopsis Defence should be in the presence of Supervisory Committee and Chairperson of the department, Deans/Coordinators (or their nominee), Director Academics (or her nominee), Faculty members and senior students.
- After the successful Defence the Chairperson will notify to the DA that the student (her name) has successfully defended the synopsis (entitled) along with the attendance sheets.
- The final notification will be made by the Director Academics.
- In case a student fails to defend, the Chairperson will notify the same and also notify the next date, time and venue of Defence.
- The synopsis Defence has no credit hours and no course code.

A candidate who has passed the comprehensive examination shall be allowed to submit thesis. But, before submission, she will have to defend thesis, at University level through video conference. This presentation shall be evaluated by the Supervisory Committee and if found acceptable, the final submission may be allowed.

18.1 SUBMISSION AND EVALUATION PROCEDURE OF THESIS

- **18.1.1** The thesis shall be completed according to the guidelines approved by the Board of Academics and Research (BASR) and shall be submitted to the office of the Director Academics within 90 days after the termination of the semester.
- 18.1.2 A student shall be entitled to submit thesis for examination after she has qualified the approved courses work, qualified the comprehensive examination and has also fulfilled the residential requirements. She is required to submit thesis examination fee before the submission of semi-final thesis.
- 18.1.3 The thesis shall be prepared according to the guidelines approved by the Directorate of Academics and shall be submitted to the office of the Director Academics
- 18.1.4 The colour of hard bound cover of Ph.D. Program should be dark green with title superimposed in golden.
- 18.1.5 The thesis duly certified by the Supervisory Committee that the contents and form of the thesis are satisfactory for submission shall be sent to the external examiner by the office of the Controller of Examinations (CE) for evaluation.

19. External Evaluation of PhD Dissertation

19.1 The PhD dissertation must be evaluated by:

At least two external experts who shall be: PhD faculty member from the world top 500 universities ranked by the Times Higher Education or QS World Ranking in the year corresponding to dissertation evaluation year OR Pakistan-based Distinguished National Professors, Meritorious Professors from any national university; or professors from top universities ranked by HEC; or professors from any Pakistani University having a minimum H-Index 30 for sciences, 15 for Social Sciences or 8 for Art & Humanities as determined by Web of Science.

OR

- 19.2 At least one external expert qualifying any one of the conditions mentioned at 'a' above if the PhD candidate publishes dissertation research in a peer-reviewed journal that is classified by the HEC in category W for Sciences and X or above for Social Sciences.
- 19.3 Two examiners as first choice and two as an alternate in case of being unable to get consent for thesis examination out of the panel of fifteen experts (Ten experts from foreign and five from Pakistan) recommended by the respective Board of Studies shall be appointed by the Vice Chancellor for the evaluation of thesis. The panel of experts should represent at least 4 Technologically/Academically Advanced Countries.
- 19.4 The Controller of Examinations shall get the thesis evaluated within four months after the date of submission / re-submission of thesis to her office. Any delay beyond three months must be brought to the notice of the Vice Chancellor.
- 19.5 The thesis must be an original and scholarly contribution to the knowledge of the candidate's chosen field of study.
- 19.6 Each External Examiner shall explicitly state in her report:
- a) Whether or not the thesis is of sufficient merit to justify the award of Ph.D. Degree to the candidate.
- b) Whether the candidate should be allowed to revise and re-submit her thesis. In the later case the broad lines on which the thesis should be revised must be clearly stated.
- 19.7 If both the examiners approve the thesis, the candidate shall be recommended for the Viva examination through HEC Video link (Final Defence) and award of the degree.
- 19.8 A Ph.D. candidate is obliged to submit three copies of her Ph.D. thesis for evaluation.
- 19.9 A summary be added showing annotated replies as also verified by the concerned Chairperson /Director.
- 19.10 The Ph.D. thesis will be placed in the office of the Chairperson/Incharge of the concerned department for one week prior to its submission for foreign evaluation. The suggestion received if in order will be incorporated through the Supervisory Committee.
- 19.11 If both the examiners reject thesis, the candidate shall be declared as failed. However, the Board of Advanced Studies and Research (BASR) may allow a student to re-conduct her research and re-submit her thesis on a new topic as recommended by her Supervisory Committee. This facility would be available only once within the period of residential requirements i.e. 10-14 semesters.
- 19.12 If one of the examiners approves the thesis and the other rejects it, it shall be sent to a third examiner, for evaluation. If the third examiner approves the thesis, the candidate shall be recommended for the award of the degree, otherwise she shall be declared as failed.

- 19.13 If one of the examiners approves the thesis and other is of the view that it is not acceptable in the form in which it has been presented but requires revision, the following procedure shall be followed:
- (i) The Supervisory Committee of the candidate may either:
- (a) write to the examiners concerned explaining why it is not possible to revise the thesis and taking the position that it should be examined in its original form, or
- (b) If the views of the examiner were acceptable to the Committee, require the candidate to revise and re-submit the thesis within a period not exceeding two semesters, for re-evaluation.
- (ii) If the examiner approves the original thesis or the revised thesis, as the case may be, the candidate shall be recommended for the award of the degree
- (iii) In case of disagreement between the Supervisory Committee and the examiner, the matter shall be referred to the Board of Academics and Research (BASR) which may suggest such action as it may consider expedient.
- 19.14 If both the examiners express the opinion that the thesis as presented, is not acceptable, but required revision the following procedure shall be adopted:
- (i) In case the lines, on which the examiners have suggested revision of the thesis are substantially the same and are acceptable to the Supervisory Committee, they shall call upon the candidate to revise the thesis on these lines and re-submit it within a period not exceeding two semesters, for re-evaluation. The revised thesis shall then be sent to the examiners.
- (ii) In case the lines on which the examiners have suggested revision are not acceptable to the Supervisory Committee, the matter shall be referred to the Board of Academics and Research (BASR) which may suggest such action as it may consider expedient.
- (iii) In case a candidate, who is required to revise and re-submit her thesis, does not do so within the period allowed, she shall be declared to have failed.

19.15 Research Publication

- (i). For award of PhD degree, a PhD researcher shall be required to publish 01 research articles meeting the following criteria: At least:
 - (a) One research article in W category journal or two research articles in X category journals, for Science disciplines
- (b) One research article in X category journal or two research articles in Y category journals, for Social Science and Humanities and Language disciplines
- (ii) The PhD researcher shall be the first author of these publications.
- (iii) The research article shall be relevant to the PhD research work of the PhD researcher.
- (iv) The article shall be published after approval of the research synopsis.
- (v) The article shall be published in a relevant research journal

- Note:- (i) The expenditure to be incurred on research articles submitted to W category journals will be borne by the University.
- (ii) Finally approved three copies of hardbound Ph.D. thesis along with two CDs. one each for HEC and University Library shall be provided by the student.
- 19.16 If the thesis, submitted by a candidate for final evaluation, is proved to be copied / plagiarized, it will be liable to be rejected. The admission of such a candidate shall be cancelled and she will not be readmitted to Ph.D. under any circumstances.
- 19.17 If the thesis of a candidate is proved to be plagiarized after its evaluation and declaration of result, previous result of the candidate will be cancelled and she will be declared to have failed in thesis examination. Such a candidate shall not be re-admitted to Ph.D. under any circumstances

20. PROCEDURE FOR DEFENDING THESIS

- **20.1** While defending PhD thesis by a PhD scholar in the absence of Co-supervisor/ Member, the Chairperson of the Department/Director of the Institute in which student is enrolled will sign on behalf of co-supervisor or member. Note: (In case the Chairperson of Supervisory Committee is also a Chairperson of Teaching Department or Director of Institute and is on leave (within country) he must attend the PhD thesis Defence and a date in this regard shall be fixed with his/her consultation.
- 20.2 For "Minor Change" in the title of the synopsis/thesis, a letter from the Supervisory Committee of the student, will serve the purpose.
- 20.3 In case of major change, the student will have to defend it again at University level and evaluated by the Supervisory Committee.
- 20.4 The student who enrolls extra semesters beyond the minimum residential period (six semesters) will have to pay full semester fee for each and every extra semester.
- (i) The students who will enroll 9th and 10th semester in their Ph.D. program will not be allowed hostel accommodation.
- (ii) After submission of the thesis, the students will not be allowed to stay in the University hostels.

21. DEGREE COMPLETION TIMELINE

- 21.1 The PhD degree shall be awarded by the universities not before the completion of three years or six regular semesters and not after completion of eight years or 16 regular semesters, save exceptions mentioned at clause 3.12(iv).
- 21.2 The completion date of PhD degree shall be reckoned with the date of notification of the award of PhD degree.

The maximum duration shall be determined from the date of student enrollment until the date of the completion notification of the PhD degree. iv. In case a student is unable to secure a PhD degree within the prescribed timeframe and claims for extension in duration, the university may constitute appropriate authority and determine the causes for delay. In event of force majeure i.e., delay on account of circumstance beyond the control of student, the university may grant an extension in the period of award of PhD degree in accordance with the duration limiting factor(s) and shall also take corrective measures in case the delay is caused due to process or administrative reasons.

22. GENERAL REGULATIONS

- 22.1 The maximum number of Ph.D students under the supervision of a full time faculty member will be 5 which may be increased to 8 under special circumstances in certain teaching departments subject to prior approval of HEC
- 22.2 There should be at least three relevant full time Ph.D. Faculty members to launch the Ph.D. program.
- 22.3 A candidate who has fulfilled all the requirements prescribed for the course shall be awarded the Degree of Doctor of Philosophy.

23. ANTI PLAGIARISM POLICY 2024

23.1 INTERPRETING AND APPLYING THE SIMILARITY INDEX

For submission of assignments, theses, and research papers, the 19% Similarity Index score for all disciplines is indicative of the possibility of plagiarism. In the case of theses/dissertations etc., the Ph.D./Supervisory Committee will function as an Expert Committee in this regard. ORIC will be responsible to check the Similarity Index and will release report to the student which will be attached to the Dissertation/Thesis.

23.2 PENALTIES FOR PLAGIARISM

If the plagiarized thesis is accessible on the web page its access shall be removed. The paper itself shall be kept in the database for future research or legal purposes

The author(s) shall be asked to write a formal letter of apology to the authors of the original thesis that was plagiarized, including an admission of plagiarism.

23.3 APPEAL

The affected student may appeal to the Vice Chancellor for a review of the findings or may submit a mercy petition within 30 days from the date of notification. Such appeals/petitions shall be disposed off within 60 days of receipt, by following the laid down procedures regarding such appeals.

Miscellaneous Rules & Regulation

1. ATTENDANCE SHORTAGE

The minimum percentage required for the students of all degree programs to appear in the final examinations is 75%. The students having less than 75% can apply to waive off deficiency through chairperson/Incharges of the department. For this purpose 5% can be waived off by the Coordinator/Dean of the respective faculty. A student having less than 70% attendance can appear in the examination.

2. WITHDRAWAL OF COURSES

AA student having less than 70% attendance or any other reason like medical issues/domestic problems etc. can withdraw on the any two courses (without getting fail credit). For that she has to seek permission of the Vice Chancellor through Chairperson/Incharge/Dean/Coordinator and Director Academics at least two weeks before the final examinations.

3. UNFAIR MEANS

Plagiarism, cheating and using other unfair means constitute unprofessional conduct. Unfair means include discussion and exchange of all such class notes and written material between the students which may subvert the learning process. Exchanging or passing information to other students over the network during lab examination is considered cheating.

Any form of unfair means will be immediately reported by the teacher to the Disciplinary Committee. Severity of Penalty imposed on the student can range from a zero in the assignment/quiz/exam, a failing grade or one grade lower than what is actually obtained in the course, any additional assignment/work before completion of degree or separation from the program.

4. PAPER RE-CHECKING

In case a student is not satisfied with her award even after checking answer book, or clarification from the teacher, she may make written complaint to Chairperson/ Incharge/ Director/ Principal/ Dean/ Coordinator who will refer her case to the Examination Committee of the Department/ Institute/College/University.

The teacher shall handover the papers of a course to the Departmental Controller of Examinations/ Chairperson/Coordinator who shall keep them in her custody till the notification of the final result of the program

5. DISPOSAL OF ANSWER SHEETS AND ADMISSION FORMS:

Controller of Examinations will maintain the record of used answer sheets of all degree programs from year 2013 to onwards for a period of one year after the notification of result. Furthermore, after one year. The first page title page all the used answer sheets will be shredded after seeking approval of the Vice Chancellor and the remaining sheets will be auctioned accordingly. All the admission forms from year 2013 to onward for all degree programs will be maintained till the completion of half of the degree period viz four semesters for BS, two semesters for M.A/ M.Sc / M.Phil / MS and three semesters for Ph.D. and thereafter the first page (title page) will be shredded after seeking approval from the Vice Chancellor and the remaining sheets will be auctioned, accordingly.

6. MIGRATION POLICY AND LEAVE RULES

6.1 MIGRATION POLICY

There will be no local migration within city. Moreover, migration from private institution to Government institution is also not allowed. A student can apply for migration if she meets the open merit with following conditions:

The student's marks should not be less than university's open merit of the particular major. The Academics certification of the student will be examined by the Migration Committee. Migration will be notified by registrar office after the recommendation of the Academics department and Migration Committee.

The NOC and character certificate from the respective universities/ colleges have to be provided by the student.

6.2 TRANSFER OF CREDIT HOURS

- a. Credits are transferred on course to course basis i.e. a person taking course A at sity Y provided that course A is equivalent to course B taught at the Y University
- b. The percentage of the students in the courses which were passed from the parent University (s) may be considered the minimum percentage of this University in the GPA/CGPA i.e. A grade=80%, B grade =65% and C grade = 50% (irrespective of her percentage acquired at parent University (s) while granting migration) and this practice should be continued in future migration cases.
- c. No credit hour of a course will be transferred if the grade is less than C for undergraduate and B for graduate level.
- d. HEIs are at liberty to enroll students (if they fulfill their criteria) for any semester or script for the courses completed.
- e. Credit hours may only be transferred between Chartered HEIS.
- f. Migration shall be allowed after successful completion of one Academics year, having CGPA 3.00 out of 4.00 from Public Sector Universities.
- g. Migration is allowed only up to 50% credit hours of the Program.

6.3 Leave Rules:

All All types of leaves (marriage leave, Ummrah leave, Hajj Leave, Medical Leave and any other type of leaves during the semester) will be counted as absent while calculating the attendance shortage of the student in the course. Furthermore, if a student continuously remains absent for a week without intimation, she will be struck off from the university roll by the respective Coordinator/Dean.

However, she may seek re-admission through the request forwarded from Coordinator / Dean office upon submission Rs. 5000/- re-admission fee. A student can avail Facility of readmission only one time in whole degree.

The student participating/representing the university with due approval of the Competent Authority in various co-curricular activities / sports at national and international level will be considered / counted as present during the event period while calculating attendance shortage. Moreover, there will be no final examination for them 2nd time.

7. SUMMER SEMESTER

- 7.1 The name of the semester is summer semester rather than Make-up semester
- 7.2 Summer semester is offered every year after spring semester.
- 7.3 The summer semester is offered to all the students (1st to 8th semester for BS, 1st to 4th semester for MA/MSC, M.Phil all semesters & PhD all semester) and these students are allowed to enroll to pass their fail/withdrawn course(s) are to improve their lower grades (D for BS/MA/MSC and C for M.Phil & PhD).
- 7.4 Internship can also be enrolled.
- 7.5 NO course will be offered for less than five students, except for students after 8th semester for BS and 4th semester for MA/MSc.
- 7.6 The maximum credit hours which a student can enroll during summer is 12.
- 7.7 The student will pay @ per credit hour along with Rs.5000/- however student who enrolls maximum credit hours i.e. 12 will pay full semester fee rather than @ per credit in addition to Rs. 5000/-.

CODE OF CONDUCT

The Student Code of Conduct is the set of rules and regulations to maintain discipline among the students. It is intended to provide a broad guideline in identifying and discouraging behavior which conflicts with building of a strong and just community that respects and protects the diverse interests and goals of all students, the University's mission, community service, and the freedom of intellectual expression. This Code of Conduct will be enforced in the University. GCWUF believes that regulations, guidelines and safeguards described herein are indispensable features to maintain an ideal Academics environment.

Definition of Terms

The expressions used in these regulations and Code of Conduct shall have the meaning assigned to them respectively.

Definitions of different terms are:

- 1. Complainant means a person who makes a complaint or reports a violation of the University Student Code of Conduct or University regulations and policies.
- 2. Intentional means deliberate.
- 3. Respondent means a person who has been accused of violating the University Student Code of Conduct.
- 4. Student means any currently enrolled person for whom the institution maintains educational record, as defined by the University regulations.
- 5. Reckless means careless or heedless of the potentially harmful consequences of one's behavior, where risk of harm to persons, property or normal University operations exists or can be reasonably foreseen.
- 6. University Official is a person employed by the University in an administrative, supervisory, Academics, research, or support staff position.
- 7. Authority: means Vice Chancellor, Committee and DSA as the case may be.
- 8. Discipline Committee: means a committee constituted under the rules of the University consisting of members and co-opted members.
- 9. Punishment: includes any penalty which Discipline Committee deems fit, defined in the rules.
- 10. DSA: means Director Students Affairs and includes other officers of the Directorate.
- 11. DDC/ DVC: means Departmental Discipline Committee or Departmental Vigilance Committee, consisting of not more than three members out of which one will be Convener.
- 12. Officer: means officer of BPS-17 and above of the University in Academics and non-Academics departments and includes members of Vigilance Committee.
- 13. Fine: Fine imposed by the committee or recommended by an officer, member of vigilance committee or by any person approved by the Authority.
- 14. Chairperson: means Head of the teaching department.

Academics Dishonesty

Academics dishonesty is an act of fraud, which may include misrepresentation, deceit, falsification, or trickery of any kind that is done by the student with the purpose, intent, or expectation of influencing a grade or other Academics evaluation.

Academics dishonesty also includes forgery and falsification of University Academics documents, intentionally attempting or damaging the Academics work of others, or assisting other students in acts of dishonesty. Common examples of Academicsally dishonest behavior include, but are not limited to the following:

Cheating

Intentionally using or attempting to use unauthorized materials, information, or study aids in any Academics exercise; copying from another student's examination sheet; submitting work prepared in advance for an in-class examination; taking an examination for another person or conceiving to do so.

Fabrication

Intentional and unauthorized falsification or invention of any information or citation in an Academics exercise.

Facilitating Academics Dishonesty

Intentionally or knowingly helping or attempting to help another to commit an act of Academics dishonesty.

Plagiarism

Intentionally or knowingly representing the words or ideas of another as one's own in any Academics exercise; failure to attribute direct quotation, paraphrase, or borrowed facts or information.

Unauthorized Collaboration

Providing, either knowingly or through negligence, one's own work to assist a student in satisfying a course requirement, or representing material prepared by or with another as one's own independent work. In instances where students are permitted to work jointly to complete an assignment, instructors will offer clear guidelines about when and how to collaborate, if a student is unsure, it is the responsibility of the student to ask the instructor.

Unfair Means

Use of unfair means generally covers the following:

- 1. An attempt to have access to the question paper before the test/ examination.
- 2. Use/ possession of unauthorized reference material during test/ examination.
- 3. Any form of communication by the examinees with any one in or outside the test/ examination room whiles the test / examination is in progress.
- 4. Unauthorized entry into faculty's office with the intention of having an access to or tempering with the official record/ exam paper etc.
- 5. Any form of communication by the examinees with any one in or outside the test/ examination room whiles the test / examination is in progress.

Moral Dishonesty

Moral dishonesty means an act which does not conform to known norms of decency.

Extension of the GCWUF Code of Conduct

The GCWUF Code of Conduct applies to conduct that occurs in the University premises, at GCWUF sponsored activities, and to off-campus conduct that adversely affects the University reputation and / or the pursuit of its objectives. Each member of GCWUF shall be responsible for her conduct.

Classroom Standards

The individual faculty member is primarily responsible for managing the classroom environment. If a student engages in any prohibited or unlawful acts or other behavior that results in disruption of a class, she may be directed by the faculty member to leave the class and report the matter to the concerned Chairperson/ Incharge, who will forward the matter to DDC/ DVC/ Director Students affairs. Students must be protected against infringement of their rights and unfair practices.

Identification or Registration Card

Each member of the University Community is issued a picture Identification / Registration card or visitors pass, and must wear it at all the times while on University premises or at University-sponsored activities. Identification / Registration cards must be presented upon entering University buildings and must be worn while in University premises.

Identification / Registration cards are not transferable. The owner of the card will be called upon to account for any fraudulent use of her identification card and will be subject to disciplinary action by the University if she has aided such fraudulent use. The card will be forfeited if the student to whom it was issued allows any other person to use the same.

Upon card owner's withdrawal from the University, all rights and privileges related to the identification card will be automatically ceased. If the student withdraws, or is suspended or expelled, from the University, the identification cards must be surrendered to the institute as the case may be.

Visitors and Guests

Students can not invite any visitor without the permission of Competent Authority. Students may be held accountable for the acts of misconduct of their guests while in University premises or at University-sponsored activities. Visitors, including invitees shall conduct themselves, at all times, in a manner which is consistent and in line with maintenance of orderly behavior in the University premises.

Acts of In-discipline or Prohibited Conduct

All students are prohibited from engaging in conduct resulting in, or leading to, any of the following:

Academics Dishonesty

Violating the University Policy or Academics Dishonesty by committing, or attempting to commit Academics dishonesty including, but not limited to, cheating, plagiarism, facilitating Academics dishonesty of others and unauthorized collaboration.

Abuse, Assault, Threatening Behavior

Intentionally or recklessly endangering, threatening or causing physical or mental harm to any person/ student, or oneself, in University premises or University-sponsored activities, or intentionally or causing reasonable apprehension of such harm including but not limited to abusive language and / or physical or verbal intimidation harassment, coercion etc.

Violation of Disciplinary Sanction

Violating terms of any disciplinary sanction imposed in accordance with GCWUF Statutes.

Furnishing False Information, Forgery or Unauthorized Use of Documents

Intentionally furnishing false information to the University and its officials; or misusing affiliation with the University to gain access to outside agency/ services; or using false information or University resources to compromise the name of University. Forgery, unauthorized alteration, or unauthorized use of any University documents or electronic transmission, or instrument of identification, or Academics and non-Academics records, signatures, seals, or stamps thereof.

Disorderly Conduct or Indecent Behavior

Intentionally furnishing false information to the University and its officials; or misusing affiliation with the University to gain access to outside agency/services; or using false information or University resources to compromise the name of University. Forgery, unauthorized alteration, or unauthorized use of any University documents or electronic transmission, or instrument of identification, or Academics and non-Academics records, signatures, seals, or stamps thereof.

Theft

Theft, or attempted theft, of property or services in University premises or at University-sponsored activities.

Damage to Property or its Destruction

Intentionally or recklessly destroying or damaging, or attempting to destroy or damage, University property or the property of others in University premises or at University-sponsored activities.

Non-compliance with Official Direction

Failure to comply with reasonable directions of University officials acting in performance of their duties.

Violation of University Regulation and Policies

Violating University regulations or policies including amendments and additions adopted since the publication date.

Alcohol or Drugs or Intoxicants

Distribution, possession, and consumption of alcohol/drugs/intoxicants on University premises or at University- sponsored activities.

Unauthorized Access to Facilities

Unauthorized access or entry to, or use of University facilities and equipment, unauthorized possession, duplication or use of keys to any university premises, facilities or equipment; or, unauthorized use of University premises.

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Unauthorized Access to Facilities

Unauthorized access or entry to, or use of University facilities and equipment unauthorized possession, duplication or use of keys to any university premises, facilities or equipment; or, unauthorized try to or use of University premises.

Unauthorized use of Computer or Electronic Communication Devices

- 1. Theft or other abuse of computer facilities and resources including, but not limited to: -
- 2. Unauthorized entry into a file, to use, read, or change the contents, or for any other purpose.
- 3. Unauthorized transfer of a file.
- 4. Use of another individual's identification and/or password.
- 5. Interference with the work of another student, faculty member or University official.
- 6. Sending obscene, abusive or threatening message.
- 7. Transmission of computer viruses.
- 8. Interfering with normal operation of the University computing system.
- 9. Unauthorized duplication of software or other violation of copy right laws.
- 10. Unauthorized access to, or unauthorized, mischievous or malicious use of University computer equipment or networks, or electronic communication devices, or the use of such equipment or devices to gain unauthorized access to, and/or use of, off-campus computer equipment.
 - Use of computer only for Academics purpose is allowed.

Animals & Pets

Bringing an animal into any University building, with the exception of animals used for laboratory purposes or animals used for security purpose, for which permission has not been granted by the University Authority.

Demonstration

Walking in large groups, shouting and talking, loudly near class rooms, aimless sitting in corridors after class timings, demonstrations engaging in unlawful acts that cause or imminently threaten injury to person or property, infringes on the rights of other member of University Community leading to or inciting others to disrupt scheduled and/ or normal activities within any campus building or area (or any University sponsored activity).

Political Activities

The involvement of GCWUF staff and students in political / illegal activities either through physical participation, media and other sources or extending any support material, is strictly prohibited. In case of violation, strict disciplinary action will be taken against the delinquent.

Harassment

- I. Passing remarks, placing visual or written material, aimed at a specific person or group:-
- a. With the intention of causing harm to person or group; and / or,
- b. Creating an environment which limits a student's educational opportunity.
- ii. Making unwanted verbal or physical advances or explicit derogatory statements towards individuals, which cause them discomfort or humiliation or which interferes with their educational opportunity.
- iii. Physical assault.

Gambling

Unauthorized / illegal exchange of money favors or services as a result of a planned/unplanned game or competition. The act of influencing, bribing/gratifying any member of teaching or non-teaching staff to attain personal gains/favors.

Smoking

Smoking is prohibited in University premises.

Mobile Phones

Use of mobile phone in the class room is completely banned. It should be switched off during class hours. No one can bring mobile phone during exams in the examination room/hall.

Abuse of the Student Conduct System

Abusing the student conduct system including, but not limited to:

- I. Failure to obey the notice from a University official to appear for a meeting or hearing as part of the student conduct system.
- ii. Falsification, distortion or misrepresentation of information before a hearing body or designated hearing officer of the University.
- iii. Disruption or interference with the orderly conduct of a hearing proceeding.
- iv. Causing a violation of University Code of Conduct hearing to convene in bad faith.
- v. Indecent Behavior at the Campus/Disturbing Academics Atmosphere: Indecent behavior exhibited at the campus including classes, cafeteria, laboratories etc, defying the norms of decency, morality and religious/cultural/social values by single or group of students.

Off-Campus Conduct

Conduct occurring off university premises is such that it should not affect the interest/image of the University.

Enforcement of Code of Conduct

Matters of indiscipline would be referred to the institution or GCWUF authorities, who are authorized to check indiscipline matters and decide as per GCWUF rules, regulations and policy, or as per the decision of Discipline Committee it deems fit. Parents of those students who disobey authority and violate the code of conduct will be informed. Students are not allowed to bring their guests at the Campus except their parents.

Punishment or Penalty for acts of Indiscipline: Punishment or penalty for acts of indiscipline shall be according to the gravity of the case and may be any one or more of the following: -

Minor Punishments

- I. Warning in writing: Notice to the offender, orally or in writing, that continuation or repetition of prohibited conduct may be the cause for further
- i. Disciplinary action.
- ii. Probation: probation for a specific period not exceeding four months.
- iii. Fine: fine which may amount from Rs.500/- to Rs. 5000/-
- iv. Hostel Suspension / Payments Removal: Expulsion from the hostels for specific period, or permanent removal from the residence hall.
- v. Withholding of certificate: Withholding of a certificate of good moral character.
- vi. Removal of privileges: Deprivation from the privileges enjoyed by the students.
- vii. F-Grade: Award "F" Grade in a paper / cancellation of the examination for one paper or more.

Major Punishments

- I. Rustication: Rustication from the class for a specified period up to two semesters after the expiry of the punishment, the student shall be:
- i. Admitted in the semester where she left.
- ii. Fine: Fine which may amount up to Rs.10, 000/-
- iii. Exam Result: Cancellation of examination result.
- iv. Expulsion: includes expulsion from the University for indefinite periods, cancellation of studentship and admission, ineligibility for further admission.
- v. Degree: Non conferment of degree / transcript.

Other sanctions or combination of above mentioned punishments as deemed appropriate.

Federal/Provincial Laws and Ordinances

Violation of a Federal/Provincial law or ordinance will be dealt with accordingly under these laws.

Social and Cultural Norms

Student is strictly reminded to follow the accepted social and cultural norms of the society. Undue intimacy and unacceptable proximity, openly or in isolated areas will not be tolerated.

Littering

It is the responsibility of all to keep the campus environment clean and tidy. Therefore, no littering or trash should be carelessly thrown or left on the Campus premises. The designated waste boxes should be used for the purpose.

Dress code

In order to maintain Academics dignity and sanctity of the institution, students and staff of the university are required to wear decent dress, keeping in view the local cultural values. The dress restriction is not to impose any rigidity or regimentation but is in accordance with the spirit of discipline and punctuality which is the cardinal aspect of life style at GCWUF campus. Purpose of Dress Code is to establish the basic guideline for appropriate work dress that promotes a positive image of GCWUF and also allows maximum flexibility to maintain good morale, respect, cultural values and due consideration for safety while working at laboratories. To abide by the student dress code, student should not wear:

- I. T-Shirts / dress bearing language or Art, which appears to be provocative or indecent and is likely to offend others.
- ii. Torn clothing.
- iii. Jogging or exercise clothing during classes.
- iv. Put on excessive makeup or wear expensive jewelery.
- v. Untidy, gaudy or immodest dress in classrooms, canteen and university offices.
- vi. Unprofessional attire in formal programs and interviews.
- vii. Dupattas are compulsory part of the dress.
- viii. Abaya or Veil during classes is not allowed.

All faculty members and administrative officers, support staff and students will be expected to monitor this code of conduct and report any such disregard or violations to the Competent Authority, Discipline Committee and DSA for taking appropriate action / remedial measures.

Dispensary

The Directorate of Students Affairs provides health services to the students, faculty, staff and employees. The main objective of its Dispensary is to provide First-Aid facility to patients.

Introduction

Biochemistry is the application of chemistry to the study of biological processes at the cellular and molecular level, it emerged as a distinct discipline around the beginning of the 20th century by combining chemistry, physiology and biology to investigate the principles of chemistry in living systems. The Government College Women University Faisalabad (GCWUF) was upgraded from college to university in 2013 and the Department of Biochemistry was developed at GCWUF in 2016.
